He and Sharon will teach the course beginning July every Tuesday

and Thursday mornings. There will be another eight class course offered beginning in August.

For 9-11 year olds the classes go from 9 a.m. until 10:30 a.m. while the 12 and older group start at 10:45 a.m. One half hour is devoted to a warm-up to avoid problems with injuries.

The first half of the course will be devoted to teaching the moves while the second half the students will have a chance to improvise, Geoff said.

Everyone has their own style and instructors can only show students the basic steps, he said.
