

Coach gets more than his team

Sometimes, I can't tell who gets more out of it. Me, the coach, or the Giants, my team. It's something I have to understand, though, if I'm truly going to appreciate Terry Laidlaw, coach of the Arc Angels floor hockey team.

I derive pleasure from coaching little league baseball. Tons of it. I get pleasure from working with the kids; seeing them work at and improve their baseball skills. I take pleasure from being part of a team, from the personal relationships I have developed with each of the boys. I absolutely love winning.

All in all, I think I get more out of it than the kids do. For the boys, It's just a baseball game, some fun two nights each week. For me, it's a quest; a calling. I was born to pitch batting practice.

Enough about me. Let's look at Terry Laidlaw.

Laidlaw began working with the Angels, a floor hockey team composed of mentally handlcapped individuals employed with Arc Industries in Hornby, about eight years ago. LIFETIME MEMBER

Recently, Laidlaw, a Norval apple farmer, was given a honorary lifetime membership to the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded. Obviously, in a very special way, Laidlaw was born to pitch batting practice, too.

In a recent interview, Laidlaw explained that the relationship between himself and the players has become a mutually satisfying one over the years. In an entirely unselfish way, however, he gets most excited about what he gets from the situation, rather than from what he puts into it.

"They really are a unique group of guys," Laidlaw, 26, attempts to explain, enthusiasm spilling over his wall of social modesty. "There is something I can gain from being with them that is very different. It's a kind of personal growth."

Laidlaw and his younger brother Wayne, 24, coach the Angels every Monday night through the winter at the Huttonville Public School gym, from 7:30 p.m. - 9 p.m. They accompany the team to league and tournament games, travelling to Hamilton, Brampton, Mississauga and Oakville for games.

Their league is a highly-competitive and skilled one, with two exceptionally strong teams, and a couple of weak sisters. The Angels played in the middle of the pack this winter.

Much of what the Laidlaw boys do is just what it should be; basic coaching. The teaching of game skills and stretegy, and the application of a little back-street psychology.

That's what they put into it, on the surface. Beyond that are the other factors, like caring, dedication, perseverence, reliability and patience. The players take out whatever they need.

All or any of the above. "For them, the competition is extremely important," Laidlaw explains. "The team is a purpose for them. The team is more important to

"For me, it's more personal." Terry and Wayne realized a long time ago that, if they realized satisfaction only from tangible results like winning and player-improvement, then satisfaction could be a long time

"It's worthwhile because of the friendships you make," Laidlaw says, "We really have a lot of
