## Meteors finally crash lose 4-3 to Guelph

Last week, the Georgetown IGA Mosquito Meteors lost their first contest in the Mid-Ontario District League when they were out-scored 4-3 by visiting Guelph.

The game began with a flurry of action and good soccer, with Brian Doherty and Paul St. Pierre buzzing to good effect in the midfield and Robbie Lockhurst marshalling the defensive corps. After 10 minutes captain Mike Melville stroked a through-pass to the on-rushing Nick Varricchio, who ran free of opponents to rifle the ball past the visiting goalkeeper.

Unfortunately, the Georgetown squad were unable to consolidate the lead, conceding a goal three minutes later following an indirect free kick awarded close

to goal. For some minutes, the balance swung to Guelph and only a courageous save by Jimmy English when two forwards broke clear kept the score even. As the interval approached, John Placido and Chris Cambouris showed more speed on the wings, while Doug Raymond and Andre Thibault were competitive on defence. Consequently, the Meteors were unlucky not to take the lead again, particularly Steve Alchin whose persistent running gave him two difficult chances that smashed into the side-netting.

The game was lost in the 10 minutes following the interval. Simple mental errors, allied to a lack of concentration and determination, presented the Guelph team with many opportunities. The visitors took three of these to build up a 4-1 lead; they

must have been astonished by the Georgetown collapse.

Fortunately, the disaster did not continue, when the home squad struck back after 50 minutes with Rich Sowery blasting the ball into the net through a maze of Guelph defenders. With time running out, the defence stabilized as Bob Donker, Richard Herrera and Sandy Jobin-Bevans allowed the visitors little room to manoeuvre and even less opportunity to threaten the Meteor goal.

Time ran out on the Georgetown efforts, for, although Nicky Varricchio notched a late goal following a free kick, the deficit could not be overcome. Having played at least evenly with Guelph for one hour, the Meteors found that a casual 10 minutes can snatch defeat from the jaws of victory.
