### Wants to form organization Student encourages injured workers

There are somewhere between 50 and 100 injured workers living in Halton Hills and Rebecca Rutherford wants to talk to them.

The second-year law student from the University of Windsor is trying to set up an association of injured workers in Halton Hills.

Similar associations have sprung up all across Ontario, including neighboring Kitchener, Hamilton, Brampton, Mississauga and Toronto.

Why are injured workers ganging together? Rebecca, 25, explains.

There's a report commissioned by the provincial government, called the Weiler Report, which makes some recommendations that have been called detrimental to injured workers.

The Weiler Report recommends doing away with pensions for injured workers and instead of giving employees a lump sum after assessing their injury, according to a rating system called "a meat chart".

**POWER**

As well, it wants to give the Worker's Compensation Board the power to say what salary an injured worker is capable of earning.

No matter what the injured worker's doctor says, the assessment by the Board's medical team takes precedence.

If the Board doctor says a worker is capable of a job with higher pay, the worker will lose in the salary differential payments he receives from the board if he doesn't take on the other job.

The Worker's Compensation Board is a board funded by employers as an insurance. Provincial funding only covers the salaries of board employees.

"It's a confusion people have, that it's people living off the government," Rebecca said. "It isn't that easy to abuse the system. There's no reason to go out and break your arm. The payments aren't worth it."

**NO ALLOWANCE**

Until this month, there was no allowance made for the cost of living increases when it came to Board payments, Rebecca said.

Now, there'll be an automatic five per cent increase for injured workers receiving permanent pensions. However, those receiving temporary benefits won't get the five per cent increase.
