The candidate for the Progressive Conservative party, he was originally elected to his seat in Parliament in 1979 and was re-elected in 1980.

"I find the attitude quite different from the 1980 election," Mr. Mc-Dermid said, noting people seemed to be giving him a warmer welcome.

Canvasser Marilyn Mitton of Georgetown trudged along with her candidate and said that only about athird of the homes they visited had people at home.

"We didn't find that many people home this afternoon," she said Monday. "That's the thing with summer campaigning."

Mr. McDermid opened his Georgetown campaign headquarters that afternoon.

Located at 178 Guelph St. in Georgetown, the former veterinary clinic now has its walls lined with posters of PC leader Brian Mulroney and the PC logo.

The campaign office will be open from noon to 5 p.m. Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Thursdays and Fridays it will be open from noon to 8 p.m. and Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The office will be closed Sundays.
