

Flynn enters race for nomination

A candidate for the Halton NDP leadership nomination is confident of his chances in the Sept. 4 election based on the strategy of the other two political parties.

Kevin Flynn, an Oakville resident who works for Mississauga Hydro in their inventory control department, says despite recent polls he's optimistic about his party's fortune.

He is the only candidate thus far for the Halton NDP nomination meeting is scheduled for Monday July 23 in Oakville.

Brian Mulroney and John Turner are trying hard to distinguish themselves from one another,

but the NDP present the only real alternative, he said.

"A lot of Liberals are out there wondering what they're doing," he said, maintaining that the NDP can make gains by attracting "soft" Liberal votes. Reform Liberals do not have a place in a Turner government, he said.

A key word when discussing issues is opportunity, said Mr. Flynn. He stressed that the NDP have always stuck up for the average Canadian and used Medicare and Canada pensions as two examples.

The 29 year old wants equal pay for a equal work for women and says the NDP will fight

for that issue immediately and not wait until the recession is abated.

Mr. Flynn said re-training programs for women and youth are appalling and statistics show that women are

Economy, jobs rate high

The economy, unemployment, women's issues, taxes and peace initiative are some of the issues which NDP candidate for the Georgetown-Brampton riding, John Deamer, will run his campaign on.

"The economy is the big one for everybody," Mr. Deamer said, in a recent telephone interview.

Mr. Deamer said that everytime the interest rates increase tens of thousands of people find

themselves out of work. "If people are willing to work they should be able to work," he said.

Calling our present situation, "not a reliable economy", Mr. Deamer said there is roughly one in five people out of work. "If everyone was working it would bring down the deficit," he said.

Mr. Deamer said the tax system we use today is basically unfair with too many people evading the system. He would like to see an

overall tax reform and a "fair and equitable" system.

"The burden of our tax system has fallen on the middle class or working class," he said.

Mr. Deamer said the NDP party has been in support of peace programs since the party was formed and he personally admires Pierre Trudeau for his peace initiative.

Commenting on the global situation Mr. Deamer said, "We have to have a universal agreement. I would like

to see the weapons scaled down on both (U.S. and Soviet) sides."

Mr. Deamer has been involved with the NDP party since he was 16 years old when he was putting campaign signs up for the party.

"We have a definite chance in this riding to do something. We, as a party, will support any good legislation that comes along and are prepared to speak up for the working men and women in the country."

Favourite Recipes

"REALLY LETHAL PECAN PIE"
(from Dinah Shore's Cookbook)

1 1/4 c. dark corn syrup
1 c. firmly packed light brown sugar
4 large eggs
4 tbsp. butter
1 tsp. vanilla
2 1/2 c. coarsely chopped pecans
9 inch unbaked pie shell

Preheat oven to 350° F. Combine corn syrup and sugar in 1 quart saucepan and stir over moderate heat until sugar is dissolved. Boil 2-3 minutes, remove from heat and stir in butter.

In large bowl beat eggs well, continue to beat while slowly pouring in syrup. Stir in vanilla and pecans. Pour into unbaked pie shell, bake 45-50 minutes or until filling has set.
