There is a commitment from soccer, via the recreation department, for a portion of the dollar costs spread over a number of years. When we consider the condition of some of our existing fields it should be obvious that another field is a necessity. At some time or other the heavy rain will leave all of our fields in the same condition as the High School. I experienced it for the first time this season last week and parts of it are dangerous to players and officials.

Attempts were made to have extensive repairs carried out this year. The timing of the repairs could not be agreed upon between the school, or the Board, on the one hand or the recreation and works departments on the other hand, I understand. The use of another field may have helped in allowing the high school field to be repaired when it was necessary.

Returning to a new field for the moment. The soccer groups in town are committed to produce funds, and attempts are being made to host a joint function or two -- we certainly have to work together, youth, senior, male and female. At some stage or other we shall all reap the benefits.

I missed the first 15 minutes or so of the Falcons -- Oakville First Division West rescheduled game last Monday and the lads were already one goal ahead. Shortly afterward Benny Beckett and Ian Wilde were on the receiving end of 'robust' tackles and had to receive attention from coach George Baines. Some slack midfield plays left the back four exposed and it came as no surprise when the visitors equalised before half time.

In the second Malcolm Evans and Steve Cartwright came on to play up front and caused a few problems with their speed and direct running. From an dash through Evans fired wide. Their presence also took pressure off Ashley Sanders on the wing and he came on to a strong match with shots and crosses. Falcons were now flying high. On rare Velebit attack the defence stood still as a forward notched the go ahead goal from close in with goalie Martin Warner left stranded. Later, an inexplicable attempt to a hitch kick by last defender Aurelia Garcia allowed a forward to run through and pick his spot for the third and deciding goal by Velebit. Falcons came on stronger and the visiting goalie had to make some

desperate saves to keep the locals out. One mistake let the Falcons in for a deserved counter. The support was vocal and enthusiastic in urging the Falcons to better things in the game and the lads responded well although no goals were forthcoming.

Whilst on about the Falcons, Ian Wilde became a married man at the weekend to Karen Wilson and this column wishes them well and lots of happiness.

Earlier the same evening the Juniors just failed to take a point against Dixie. The end result was a 4-3 loss and a spirited second half comeback almost became a success. The lads began slowly and soon found themselves down, with a first minute goal and a second came before the half. In between Collin Mutershead finished off a fine move from the right wing cross of Keith Spiller, (shades of the 'old man, Gary') in superb fashion. Late in the first half and early in the second half problems reared their ugly head and two players and a spectator were ejected from the game and another three players were cautioned, with a later caution added to the list. The remainder of the game was played, like the early part, in fine competitive spirit. Rick Kilpatrick headed a neat goal, wide of the goalie and Joe Clare lobbed a fine effort for the other Junior goals. No matter how hard the lads tried they could not find the net again to offset the four Dixie goals, three from the centre forward. On the second half display a better result was deserved.

Would it not be nice to see coaches offer up their house league players to the rep coach for trial games? Players generally improve when playing with a higher skill level and this type of assistance would benefit players and house league teams at the same time. Why would a coach, or anyone else, hold a player back from representing the club? So that the house team may win a trophy? So that the player may score ten goals a game and look a hero-heroine? So that a defender looks brilliant in house play? So that you may appear to be a great coach or player? Coach or player or parent, holding back assistance benefits no-one in the final analysis, everyone suffers, my friends.

Some parental responsibility is required in the transportation of players says commissioner Jack White. All too often players are dropped off and left to the coach and manager to take care of while the droppers off take off. With rep and bantam house league teams help is needed to move players to and from games. There are many who never shirk their responsibilities and thank you indeed for your support. To those who do not, please examine yourself and give a little more at least. You probably have no idea how much a harassed coach or manager appreciates the assistance and support you can give concerned as they are about the welfare of their players and your offspring, particularly when attempting to fill a short-handed roster. Coaches and managers have a difficult task with players, equipment, schedules and transportation and need your assistance, folks.

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# Enrolment in programs up over those of last year

What a difference a year makes. Last year the Halton Hills Recreation and Parks Department offered 15 summer programs for children, and had to cancel a number due to a lack of interest from the general public. This year, after trimming the total number of programs to 10, the department is finding everything is going better than scheduled.

"Most of our programs are operating above budget," said Jane Trueman, summer activities coordinator for the department. "At the end of the summer last year we had to look at some of the programs and ask why they were cancelled."

One of the reasons for the department's success has been the incorporation of new day passes for the summer programs. The passes are for those people who can only make it certain number of days to their programs. The passes are purchased for 15 per day, thus allowing the child a chance of both attending the programs he is interested in without having to pay full program cost.

"With the passes, the child shows up whenever he can. We're getting an average of seven to 10 children showing up to programs over and above the 12 we need to keep the program operating," she said.

Trueman said the department, budgeted for at least 12 participants in each program in order to get back 50 per cent of the money they spent for each summer activity. If less than 12 enrol, then there is a strong chance that program will have to be cancelled. If more than 12 show up, then more money might have to be spent on it.

Another new twist for the department has been the adoption of a new staff position. A Special Needs Supervisor has been hired to look into how to better treat and accommodate handicapped children into summer programs. It is a move that Trueman feels is responsible for the increase in enrolment this year by handicapped children into the programs.

"The Special Needs Supervisor goes to the parents and teachers of the handicapped child and finds out what activities the youngster likes best and what the child is like."
