Thirty or more floats were excellent from eleven counties in West Central Ontario. Prizes for floats were in four categories - 4H Clubs, County, Commercial and Family.

Several stage coaches and dignitaries with beautiful teams of horses and one team of oxen were also in the parade. Halton's Junior Calf Club won first, depicting the 4H symbol of "Head, Heart, Hands and

Health," along with two 4H club members.

Peel County's second prize float was a full size Holstein and was built by Terry Laidlaw of Norval and Sheila (Dixon) Crowe RR4 Georgetown. The cow was finished off with 1,000 white mums by Webb's flowers.

Peel County's Dairy Princess Mary Lou Laidlaw of Norval and Amy Thompson of RR4 Georgetown were standing beside the cow. Peel also recognized six former All Canadian Holstein including Spring Farm Juliette from the farm of Jim and Jack Fraser of Huttonville.

The theme on the float for Halton was "A Golden Past and a Brighter Future" honoring the late Master Breeders in Halton County. The Halton float was planned by a committee with chairman Paul Laidlaw.

Council awarded the tender for further work on the Acton Business Improvement Area project at the Mill-Main Street intersection to G.W. Barr Construction and Engineering Limited of Brampton.

The firm's price of \$138,012 was the lower of two tenders received.

Included in the project are changes to the signs and stop lights at the intersection, work on the parkette at the corner and erection of some new light standards along the block.

Council will allocate \$20,000 from its contingency reserve for the project since it did not receive approval from the Ministry of Transportation and Communications for the connecting link portion of the plan this year.
