Riding voters increase in numbers by 20%

There's 21,000 more voters in Brampton-Georgetown riding than in 1980 and there's another 5,000 who can still get their names on the voting list.

Chief electoral officer Judy McArthur said enumerators registered 107,343 voters - a 20 per cent increase from 86,000 in 1980.

"I expected we'd get 110,000 to 112,000 and we came pretty close," said Mrs. McArthur. "Considering the number of people on holidays, we

did well and we worked very hard."

Time's running out for the 3,000 to 5,000 eligible voters who were

missed by enumerators. There will be a court of revision Aug. 15, 16 and 17 from 10 to 11 a.m. and 7 to 10 p.m. Brampton residents can register at the Century Gardens arena on Volden

"Bring your enumerator's call-back card if possible because it has your poll number and it will speed things up," said Mrs. McArthur.

All voters in a house-

hold must register in person at the court of revision.

If anybody can't make it to the court of revision, call the returning office immediately at 457-7822. A revising agent will call back to make an appointment to visit the home. The agent can register relatives by blood or marriage. Boarders can't be registered along with a

family.

"This is a one-shot deal when you make the appointment," said Mr. McArthur. "If nobody is at home, then you can't book again."

She said no arrangements are available yet for voters who miss the Aug. 17 deadline.

Although a 1980 study indicated about 30,000 Peel residents weren't Canadian citizens, Mrs.

McArthur said the enumerators encountered "fairly few" non-citizens. The 1981 census recorded 47,105 Bramptonians (one-third of the city's population), as being born outside of Canada.

AMC plant, housing are local issues

Jim Bridgewood sees a number of local issues that are important to his campaign. A candidate for the Communist Party of Canada in the riding of Brampton-Georgetown, Mr. Bridgewood says one key issue is the American Motors plant.

— He believes there has to be a full fledged guarantee that a certain number of jobs will be

created. Mr. Bridgewood also wants parts to be manufactured at the plant rather than in the United States.

The housing in Brampton is in a deplorable state with a less than 1 per cent vacancy rate, he said. There is a definite need for the government to build more low cost housing, he said.

The government should get into the business of developing to prevent land speculators from raising the prices of housing, he said.

Young farmers would be well taken care of in getting their start. Mr. Bridgewood proposes that young people from agriculture schools should be given interest-free loans and have land provided for them to work on.

He will keep his campaign expenses under \$2,000.
