## Testing water for Acton

Herald Staff Ground will be broken within a month at the first of four potential well sites in Acton, if regional council approves the tender of G. Hart and Sons of Denelon Falls, Ontario, today (Wednesday).

It's been known for a while that existing wells in Acton aren't adequate for the town's 7,000 population and with growth anticipated, finding additional water is a priority for the town.

Halton's public works department recently selected four sites on

Fourth Line near the Town Line Road (Sideroad 32) as potential wells, and has approval from property owners to start test drilling.

The tender of G. Hart and Sons was in the amount of \$21,800. A second tender, from Olympic Drilling Company Ltd. of Gloucester, was disqualified because it was incomplete.

A supervisor with the project, Benson Leung. said actual drilling will likely not begin until next month.

He said the well sites will be drilled one at a time and if the first well

site turns out to contain a water supply of good quality and quantity, the region will drill at least one more of the sites.

"The more we can develop in terms of water supply, the better it is," Mr. Leung said. "We'll drill another one to see how much more






