### New Raider GM should assume role of coach

Last week Georgetown Raiders of the Ontario Senior "A" Hockey League announced the hiring of Gil Eyre as general manager. One of the pressing issues facing the new GM is who will coach this year's team.

Gerry Inglis, who last year held that post, will not be back with the team this year.

The problem Eyre has is that it is now August, and he does not have the luxury of looking around. By his own admission, getting players for next month's training camp is a higher priority than getting a coach.

What should be done is to have Eyre assume both GM and coaching positions. That way, a lot of problems could be prevented.

In hockey circles, a general manager and coach must get along, and be able to work logether. Last year GM Dave Kentner and coach Inglis fit the bill to a tee, which would account for Georgelown's fine showing in their first year of Senior "A" competition.

With Eyre assuming both spots, he would be able to get the players he wants in camp, not having to worry about the couch's reaction. Also, he would not have to worry about a coach shaping the team into the wrong mold of the GM.

Being the coach would allow Eyre the opportunity of fixing the team just the way he wanted to, without uncertainty about their direction.

Assuming both positions would not be a new venture for the 43-year-old GM. He assumed both roles with Dundas teams in Intermediate and Senior "A" leagues, as well as on a Junior "A" level with Brantford.

Eyre spent the last half of the 1982-83 season with the Raiders as an assistant general manager, and helped out in a coaching capacity also. By being with the Raiders last year, and having been in their opposition while with Dundas' Intermediate team, Eyre has the confidence of the Raiders' executive. He is a proven performer.

A new coach would have to get to know the players and executive in a hurry, something Eyre does not have to do because of his association with the team last year. He knows what is expected, and how to go about doing it.

So one way of solving the current problem of having no coach for the Raiders would simply be to give Eyre both positions. He has the experience, and that way, he could concentrate on getting the players needed to make Georgetown get over the final hump in their quest for an Allan Cup.
