NORTH HALTON VS SMOKERS

The North Halton Sports team has a meagre three wins this season, but two have been major upsets.

Earlier this season one was over the Greeks and this week the other was against the Smokers.

North Halton pivot Howie Jacobs played a strong game, maintaining a touchdown per quarter pace. He hit Greg Lawr, Bill Fournier, Sean McQuarrie and Ray Peacock for the majors. Lawr added a two-point convert and Andy Tyrell booted two converts.

The Smokers, who now own the dubious task of losing to both Norval and North Halton in one season, kept pace with the Sports crew for three quarters, but came up empty in the final quarter. Terry Diardichuk, Chris Sargent and John Vierra scored majors and Jerry Neil grabbed a two-pointer. Interceptions played a major part

in the game. Halton's Mike Schultz caught two and Fournier had another.

GREEKS VS NORVAL

Burlington had beaten Georgetown 4-1 in their league game three weeks earlier, but they were not allowed to repeat that effort as Georgetown played hard and held them to a 1-1

Acton Men's Y schedules biathlon

The Acton Y Men's Club will be holding a biathlon Saturday.

The biathlon will comprise of a 2.5 kilometer course that will see participants ride and run simultaneously.
