Small businessmen offered help by advisory group

Small businesses in Halton will now have a new shoulder to lean on when the going gets rough or they want some expert advice for implementing a new idea.

About 18 senior executives from the region have knocked their heads together and formed the Halton Small Business Advisory Group.

The group is modelled on the 20-year old Associated Senior Executives of Canada Ltd. of Toronto. The executives, all vice presidents and up, sit in panels of six members and share their business experience with the small businessman who wants some sensible advice or has a financial or labor problem.

"We've been organizing for six months," Bill McAlister, a retired management consultant told The Herald, "Our first ellent is to be registered in September."

The group is made up of retired senior executives with background in organization, marketing: accounting, personnel, financing, costing, manufacturing, product development, retail sales, inventory control he said.

Mr. McAlister said the regional chairman Pete Pomeroy picked up on the idea because of his experience as a small businessman in George-town, and encouraged the development of the Advisory Group in Halton.

Consultations for businessmen are to take place at the regional headquarters in Oakville and are strictly confidential.

The Advisory Group is incorporated and operates as a non-profit company, with the executives volunteering their skills to local businessmen.

"We see many new businesses starting in the country. If some of us, with our background, can help them be established, it would be very fulfilling for us," Mr. McAlister said.

In the fall, members of the group will be visiting the region's chambers of commerce and informing them of the service, he said.
