



FLAPS DOWN

Centennial's principal no stranger

New principal at Centennial Public School, Al Zanatta, may be new to the school but he is no stranger to the Georgetown area.

In 1973 Mr. Zanatta became vice-principal at M.Z. Bennett Public School in Acton, after which he had vice-principals duties at Stewarttown Senior Public School and Limehouse Public School.

"When I was at Stewarttown I'd hear of the sports rivalry between that school and Centennial. Now I'm on the other end of the stick. Having worked in Stewarttown I feel I've come into a community I know."

Mr. Zanatta grew up in Connaiston, Ontario, a community east of

Sudbury, and attended teacher's college in Hamilton.

Starting his teaching career with the Halton board of education in Burlington, it only took four years for Mr. Zanatta to start his vice-principalship in the north.

Upon a promotion to principal in 1980, Mr. Zanatta opened Sheridan Public School in Oakville where he stayed until his present posting.

HUMAN

Mr. Zanatta thought of a career in the teaching profession after having some "wonderful educators who had a human approach in working with adolescence," in his second-

ary school years. He said they provided excellent role models for himself.

That combined with the fact that he has always enjoyed working with people led to a teaching career.

"Being the youngest in a family of six and dealing with older family members, I feel that experience helped give me the skills in working with people," Mr. Zanatta said.

Students attending Centennial Public School this year can expect to be busy. Mr. Zanatta said he runs a "pretty traditional" school with homework being frequent and monitored regularly.

STANDARDS

"It's our responsibility to set standards for the children, (which Mr.

Zanatta expects to be high), and do the best for every student so they are ready for a secondary education."

Mr. Zanatta has used the Halton board of education's strap three times in his teaching career and said it was only as a last resort.

"I felt it was a fault in me and I had failed somewhat," he said.

All three strappings were for physical attacks on other students and Mr. Zanatta will be looking for a code of behavior that can be put in writing for Centennial Public School.

Mr. Zanatta is expecting community support in the school and is very open to parent involvement. In the coming weeks he will be busy interviewing his staff and a cross-section of parents and students to gain more insight into the school.

DIFFERENT

The father of two elementary school aged boys, Mr. Zanatta said he changes hats at home and acts more like a parent. His boys David, 8, and Kevin, 6, attend Robert Baldwin School in Milton. His wife, Grace, has been with

the Halton board of education for ten years and is now a substitute teacher while raising the children.

New vice-principal at Centennial, Mike Kasoian, will be helping Mr. Zanatta at the school.

"We're just like the two new kids on the block," he said.

Small businessmen offered help by advisory group

Small businesses in Halton will now have a new shoulder to lean on when the going gets rough or they want some expert advice for implementing a new idea.

About 18 senior executives from the region have knocked their heads together and formed the Halton Small Business Advisory Group.

The group is modelled on the 20-year old Associated Senior Executives of Canada Ltd. of Toronto. The executives, all vice presidents and up, sit in panels of six members and share their business experience with the small businessman who wants some sensible advice or has a financial or labor problem.

"We've been organizing for six months," Bill McAlister, a retired management consultant told The Herald. "Our first client is to be registered in September."

RETIRED

The group is made up of retired senior executives with background in organization, marketing, accounting, personnel, financing, costing, manufacturing, product development, retail sales, inventory control

and general business management.

Mr. McAlister said the regional chairman Pete Pomeroy picked up on the idea because of his experience as a small businessman in Georgetown, and encouraged the development of the Advisory Group in Halton.

Consultations for businessmen are to take place at the regional headquarters in Oakville and are strictly confidential.

For information or to make an appointment, call the region's business development office at 878-8113, ext. 319. There is a small fee to cover the essential expenses for the service.

The Advisory Group is incorporated and operates as a non-profit company, with the executives volunteering their skills to local businessmen.

"We see many new businesses starting in the country. If some of us, with our background, can help them be established, it would be very fulfilling for us," Mr. McAlister said.

In the fall, members of the group will be visiting the region's chambers of commerce and informing them of the service, he said.

Grant for anti-porn

The slide show has already had a public showing in New Brunswick, where Mrs. Macewan used it during a speech on prostitution and pornography made at the annual University Women's Club meeting.

Y brochure full of new ideas

Have just been perusing an interesting booklet. One which you probably have in your home too. It's the Georgetown YMCA's Fall Program Brochure. If you have not already received one, I'm sure you can pick one up at the "Y" on the corner of Mountainview and Sinclair.

Many of their popular courses are returning and several new ones have been added. I would just like to mention some of the new and innovative programs which will be available this year.

For the very youngest among us is a program called "Infant Stimulation". This is for children aged four months to a year. Parent participation is essential.

Parents will be fascinated to learn about the stages of infant growth and development and to participate with their child in simple games, exercises and action songs which stimulate the senses and encourage body movement.

"Music and Movement" is a new program for children three and a half to five years. It is a method of teaching music through body movement and will aid in the development of concentration and co-ordination. There is also a similar class for those aged six to eight years.

If you have a member of the family who is risking life and limb break dancing, perhaps you should sign them up for the "Y" Break Dancing Course. The program includes proper warm-ups and stretching, as well as dance moves and improvisation. Participants must wear knee pads.

Girls fourteen to sixteen years of age may be interested in "Young Women's Self Care". Among areas stressed will be hygiene, health, safety, poise and general lifestyle improvement. The main aim of this program is to increase confidence and independence.

Moving into the adult world there are three new programs offered. "Bridge Instruction" for the beginner or the player wishing to improve is for men and women. "The Total Woman" and "Wardrobe Planning For the Busy Woman" are obviously of more interest to those of the female persuasion.

The programs I have mentioned are only the new ones. There are dozens more, ranging from judo to calligraphy, from swimming to dog training. Get your brochure and read it.

There is bound to be some program perfect for you or for some other member of the family. You may register by mail or in person at the "Y".
