

Neither did the region's other candidate, Brad Clements of Milton. There are 842 municipalities in AMO d this year there were

members at large to the board. Since they didn't make it on the board through election, an alternative still exists for Halton to get representation on the

Miss Marshall was chosen out of 11 dairy princesses Saturday night to compete in the semi-finals and finals.




