Anti-porn group finds cross country support for cause

The local Citizens Against Violent Pornography group is gaining cross-country support, and already a sister group has started up in Mississauga.

Since it was formed two years ago, the Georgetown club has been active in bringing the issue of violence and sex up for public scrutiny and denunciation. Last weekend, member Christine Macewan brought the issues of prostitution and pornography to the annual meeting of the University Women's Club's national council.

Held in St. John, New Brunswick, Mrs. Macewan delivered an address on the topics at the national council. She

is the president of the Georgetown University Women's Club.

"The feedback was just great," Mrs. Macewan said. "A lot of people came up and said 'I had no idea'."

The slides she showed of pictures in locally available magazines like Hustler, Penthouse and Playboy proved effective.

"It's much more emphatic to see it on a slide presentation," Mrs. Macewan said. "I showed 28 slides we feel explicitly portray women, as well as some cartoons that make fun of the handicapped, some child porn and some bondage pictures."

Although it cost the Georgetown group \$106 to rent the equipment to

show two minutes of clippings from locally available video tapes, Mrs. Macewan said it was worth it.

"It upset one woman from Quebec so much she left the room," she said.

There were over 250 women representing 121 University Women's clubs across Canada present.

"I had a standing ovation," Mrs. Macewan said. "One woman offered me \$500 to send letters to all the clubs to get those clubs to send a letter to the provincial attorney general or the new Minister of Justice."

Several people asked Mrs. Macewan after her speech if Halton Hills has a special problem with pornography.

"I told them we saw what was available in town and we were upset as mothers," Mrs. Macewan said. Adult magazines are now located on shelves over five feet high.
