This year's July peak electricity demand of 15.13 million kilowatts was down slightly from last year's peak of 15.16 million kilowatts. That's because July 1984 wasn't as hot as July 1983 and so air conditioning wasn't needed as much.

Energy consumption was up 3.7 per cent from the same month last year. Almost 8.5 billion kilowatt-hours of electricity were consumed in July, compared to 8.3 billion kilowatt-hours used in July, 1983.

Fishing champs

Local youngsters, John Peddie and Brad Thornton of Georgetown, did extremely well in the first over Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters Junior Fishing Weekend.

Of the 100 teams entered John and Brad placed ninth and won two Zebco Castmaster Reels and Graphite Rods; two Rapala Lure Kits; two 250 yards Mitchell monofilament line; and two 100 yards Trilene line for their 12 fish, 6 pound 13 ounce catch.

The O.F.A.H. Junior Fishing Weekend took place over two days on Pigeon Lake northwest of Peterborough. Each team was allowed to weigh-in up to two rock bass, two sunfish, two perch, one largemouth bass, one small-mouth bass, and one walleye per day.

A four ounce bonus was given for each fish that could be released alive. Of the 583 fish caught, only one died!

Acton sign vandalism hits new high

Vandals have been attacking election signs in Acton with even more ferocity than in past campaigns, say spokesmen for the three major parties.

Conservative spokesmen Ron Henry said he does not believe the vandals are playing favorites because all three parties are being hit equally hard.

"We've got a defacing problem here," he said. "But it's not an epidemic like they have in Oakville. Some people down there are getting a bit uptight about it. Otto (Jelinek, Tory candidate) says he's never seen anything like it in the 10 years since he's been in politics."

Liberal spokesman Al Wilson estimated the vandalism as 10 times as bad as ever before. He said a lot of lawn signs are missing but it seems to be having a reverse effect on property owners from whom they were stolen.

"It's just making our

supporters that much more determined," Mr. Wilson said. "When the signs get stolen they all call up and want us to come back with another one."

New Democrat spokesman Alan Foster said vandalism has been no less than before for his party locally, but Acton is suffering nothing compared to Oakville.

"It's terrible down there," he said. "As fast as we put a sign up it's gone. It looks like someone with a real hate against our party."

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Favourite Recipes

ZUCCHINI SNACK

- 3 eggs slightly beaten
- 2/3 c. cooking oil
- 1 2/3 c. honey
- 1 tbsp. vanilla
- 2 c. zucchini finely grated, raw
- 3 c. all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tbsp. cinnamon
- 1 c. finely chopped nuts

In a medium sized bowl mix together eggs, oil, honey, vanilla and zucchini. In a large bowl mix together flour, salt, soda, baking powder and cinnamon. To this add honey mixture, stirring only enough to moisten dry mixture.

Fold in chopped nuts. Turn into 2 L. (9"x5"x2") loaf pans that have been well-greased. Bake at 325° F. for 1 hour. Cool for 10 minutes before removing from pans. (Makes 2 loaves).
