No incineration of garbage 'til '92

It's being recommended that your garbage continue to be collected and dumped in a regional landfill site for eight more years.

Landfill site is just a fancy term for garbage dump.

Friday, the region's solid waste management committee made the tough decision to dump 100 per cent of garbage for the next eight years, and after that, to incinerate 50 per cent of it.

The region was hoping to be converting garbage into useful steam power by 1988. However, opposition by various Oakville and Burlington ratepayers groups scared off a potential customer in the form of the Ford Motor Company of Canada of Oakville.

Residents neighboring the Ford plant were concerned about noise and air pollution increasing if an Energy From Waste plant were established next to the Ford facility.

The region's five-year plan leading to the building and operation of an Energy From Waste plant has proven to be unfeasible, the region's manager of waste disposal said Tuesday.

"The Energy From

Waste study shows we don't have a confirmed market in the region and that it will take longer than we thought to get one," George Woodburn said.

The region was hoping to be incinerating 75 per cent of wastes, and land-filling 25 per cent, by 1988.

"So, now we've taken somewhat of a step backwards, to assess the overall waste management system for the region and we accept that it will take longer to get EFW off the ground than we had projected back in 1983," Mr. Woodburn said.

The recommendations of the solid waste management committee are being debated Wednesday (today) at a special regional council meeting at regional head-

quarters, where final approval of them is being sought.

One of the recommendations is that a newsletter be sent out to those on the Energy From Waste and landfill mailing lists (about 2,700 people) describing the recent reports.

The proposed change in landfilling plans means a reassessment must be made by the region's consultants, Walker, Wright, Young, of the region's landfill requirements.

The consultants have been seeking out a new landfill site in the region that can be used, now that the Burlington site is full and operating on an emergency certificate issued by the Ministry of the Environment.

The reassessment will

cost \$54,900, Mr. Woodburn said.

Another ideal customer for an Energy From Waste plant was Petro-Canada in Oakville. However, neighbors in West Oakville banded together to complain, and the company has informed the region it isn't interested until the region can deal with the concerns of the neighbors, Mr. Woodburn said.

"It's part of the 'not in my backyard' thing; no matter where we go," he said. "The most disappointing thing is that no matter what waste management alternative you choose, you just can't get the support of the community."

"Whether you're talking EFW or landfill, you cannot get acceptance. You'll always be faced with opposition," Mr. Woodburn said.

There's a need for public education, which,

if met, the region is hoping will reduce opposition to its waste management decisions.

An advisory committee made up of rate payers is to be established soon

ADVENTURER, EXPLORER AND AUTHOR, IN THE 1920'S AND 30'S, JOURNEYED THRU TIBET, CLIMBED JAPAN'S MT. FUJIYAMA, SCALED MT.
