Screening for sex offenders

Schools examining hiring

Peel Board of Education hiring practices have the board asking prospective employees if they have "ever been convicted of any offense under The Criminal Code of Canada for which a pardon has not been granted."

The change comes after an incident in which a janitor sexually assaulted seven school boys in a school boiler room seven months ago.

A similar incident in Halton over a year ago had a Georgetown teacher charged with indecent assault in connection with complaints from five juvenile students.

Superintendent of employee services, Rae Stoness, with the Halton Board of Education has had a committee looking into hiring practices for

the past eight months.

INPUT
Headed up by one person in Mr. Stoness' staff there has been input from up to ten different groups in the education field.

The committee will report back to Mr. Stoness in December at which time he will make a decision on the situation.

"There will be a lot more put into print in regards to procedure and expectations, but I can't see any formal changes taking place,"

he said.

With five to seven applicants for one job opening, Mr. Stoness is confident the board's present screening process is one of the best ways hiring can be done.

Applicants are screened by more than one person and more than one person is involved with the final decision as to the hiring of the applicant.

ISSUES
With 3-4,000 employees at any given time Mr. Stoness said there are issues from time to time

involving their staff.

"We have the same problems as any employer and are not isolated from the social ills of the community," he said.

Halton Separate School director, Clifford Byrnes said "maybe a review is in order."

Over the past 12 years

he said there have been no problems in the Separate School Board with sexual offences.

"I don't know how you can prevent that from happening. You do the best you can and hope you've done adequately," he said.
