

Meteors trounce Valley team

After a disappointing defeat at Guelph, the Georgetown IGA Meteors rebounded to their best passing game of the season to overcome Grand Valley 10-0 at Cedarvale last week.

Within ten minutes, Nicky Varriecchio and Rich Sowery had capitalized on poor clearances

to put the Georgetown squad up by two goals. The pressure on the visitors' defence was virtually constant as Bob Donker, Robbie Lockhurst and Andre Thibault put a vise-like grip on the Grand Valley offence. Mostly, the Meteors controlled the ball and the pace of the

game by passing the ball from player to player while patiently waiting for a shooting opportunity. From the midfield Paul St. Pierre and Brian Daugherty were prominent and successful with high-percentage passes rather than spectacular plays.

By half-time Nicky

Varriecchio and Rich Sowery had each scored again, with Paul St. Pierre and Jimmy English pushing the score to 6-0. Chris Combours in the home net was rarely called into critical action as Richard Herrera and Doug Raymond provided him with impenetrable

defensive cover. During the second half, the midfield players such as John Placido placed further emphasis on the passing game. Further goals were inevitable, being scored by Steve Atchin, Brian Daugherty and Mike Melville added to the Georgetown total.

Perhaps the final goal typified the evening. The ball flowed sweetly from Richard Herrera to Bob Donker; his low, accurate cross found Sandy Jobin-Bevans in an open position in front of the net and he dispatched the ball goalwards to score with an unstoppable shot.

GDHS coach named to Sheridan post

Oakville's Sheridan College went looking for a women's volleyball coach, and they now feel they have come up with the missing link to an Ontario Colleges Athletic Association (OCAA) title.

Sheridan College women's athletic director Dianne Ghent said the appointment of Georgetown District High School's Grant Clatworthy to the position could solidify the team's chance at a banner year.

"We've been there in the past," she said. "But we have never been able to win the ultimate. Now with Grant, our new facility and some decent recruiting we feel like we have a good chance this year."

The position became available after last year's coach took a maternity leave. Ghent said she only considered one person for the job.

"We considered Grant to be the best possible applicant in southern Ontario," she said. "His program at Georgetown District High School is very top notch."

Last year the lady Bruins won their Tier I league, and finished third in the OCAA championships. In the past five years, the Sheridan club has been provincial finalists on three occasions.

For Clatworthy, the job presents an element of challenge.

"I'm not doing this because I see a championship there," he said. "If I saw there was no talent there, I would still have taken the job."

"It's a new challenge, that's what it is," he said.

Clatworthy has coached almost every possible team in the high school ranks. He has coached at the senior girls' level since 1975, and in seven of those nine years, his teams have been Halton County finalists.

In fact, the Georgetown girls are defending champions, and have been for the past four years. Clatworthy has also coached junior and senior boys teams.

In 1978-79 and 79-80, he guided the junior boys to a Halton title. The next season his senior boys squad won both the Halton and Peel championships. The year after that, in 1981-82, the team finished second in Halton play.

Clatworthy is not a total stranger when it comes to Sheridan. He worked as an assistant with the club two years ago, and officiated at a number of their games last season.

He said the team could improve on their third-place finish last season. Last year he was offered the same position, but turned it down.

"I was just promoted to (physical education) department head and I didn't feel like I had the time. This year I said I would try it."

With the new coaching responsibility, Clatworthy said he will still coach the GDHS senior girls team.

"I'll have someone help me this year with the senior girls team for the first time. I hope it won't affect things because this year's team is a strong one."
