The Geminis lost a 4-2 decision to Vaughn Tuesday night, but came back for an 8-6 win over Barrie Friday night at the Alcott Arena. Sunday afternoon Georgetown travelled to Nobleton and came away with a 4-3 win there.

Terry West had two goals in Friday's win while Ray Andrews, Brian Demone, Dean Hooper, Todd Cull, Wayne Morrow and Riv Kennedy handled the

rest of the scoring. Sunday afternoon Paul Jackson had two goals, including a shorthanded tally that was the eventual winner for the Geminis. Other goals went to Kent Falby and Paul Basha.

Results from Tuesday's game were not available.

Webster said he was happy coming away with two wins, but added the Geminis could have easily swept all three games had they had the breaks Tuesday.

"I felt we were the better team," he said. "We outshot them badly in the third period 23-8, but only came away with one goal."

"Their goaltender had

a good game," he said.

Webster said Sunday's game in Nobleton was not a hockey classic.

"Neither one of the teams wanted to play positional hockey it seemed. It was a case of we didn't play that well, but they played worse," he said.

"It was just about time we got a break," Webster said, adding that in prior games when the Geminis did not play well, they usually lost the game by the one-goal margin.

**Defensive lapses hurt Raiders in losses**

 There might be a sign appearing soon on the Georgetown Raiders dressing room that reads "Wanted: defensive help. Apply within."

Defence was just another word to the Raiders this week as they lost two Ontario Senior A Hockey League games. Friday night Georgetown lost a 9-6 decision to Collingwood Shipbuilders while on Saturday night the Raiders dropped their game against Dundas 6-3 at the Alcott Arena.

The losses drop the Raiders' record to two wins against five defeats so far this year.

Raiders coach-general

manager Gil Eyre was not happy with the events of the weekend.

"We have not been very good defensively," he said.

Eyre said blame cannot be pointed to either the defencemen or the goalies. He said both should take the blame equally for the Raiders' dismal defensive record.

In the seven games the Raiders have played this year, they have allowed 42 goals, which works out to an average of six goals per game. Former Cambridge Hornet netminder Dave Tataryn, who this year signed with Georgetown, has a goals-against average of six goals per game while the Raiders' other netminder Jim

Lockhurst has played in two games, and has an average of six goals per game also.

Friday night in Collingwood the Raiders and Shipbuilders were tied 6-6 with one minute left to play. But it was at that point everything broke down.

"Dave (Tataryn) went to clear the puck, and somehow one of their guys got the puck and put it in. That kind of broke our backs," Eyre said.

Eyre said the Raiders are looking at a couple of defencemen, but added nothing final has been worked out to date. Eyre would not mention names of potential Raiders.

Eyre said the Raiders will have to improve their play.

"We have to get things together," he said. "We have to get everyone playing as a team collectively."

"I just hope it does not take too long," he said.

Last week Eyre said he was looking at the possibility of acquiring former Canadian Olympic team player Darren Lowe. However, that was after a hearing was completed concerning Lowe's amateur status.

After playing for the Olympic team, Lowe played eight games with Pittsburgh Penguins of the National Hockey League. A student at University of Toronto, Lowe wants to play varsity hockey with the

Blues this season.

However, under Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union (CIAU) rules, if you play one game at a pro level, you are deemed ineligible to play varsity athletics for at least one year. Currently, Lowe is awaiting word on if indeed he can play university hockey. If he can't, the Raiders will try and sign him for this season.

Goalscorers were not made available to The Herald.

"We're so used to it because we have had our

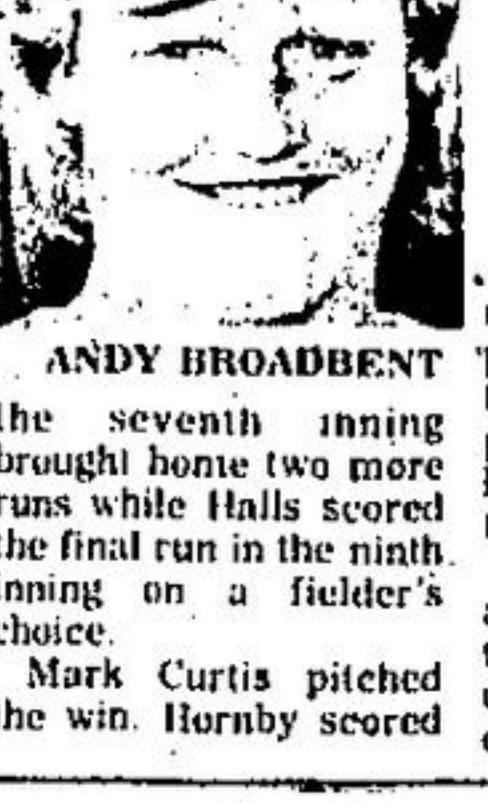
backs up against the wall for the past three weeks," he said. "We have created an opportunity for ourselves, now we have to go out and do it."

**CFL could not beat NFL stars**

If Steve Mazurak had his way, the likes of Billy Sims, Leroy Selmon and James Lofton could be playing football in Canada someday.

Mazurak is the executive director of the Canadian Football League Players' Association (CFLPA) and in a memo obtained by the Toronto Globe and Mail this week discusses the possibility of the National Football League (NFL) and the Canadian Football League (CFL) getting together for an all-star game in January. The game would be played with Canadian rules, and be held at B.C. Place in Vancouver.

The idea is Mazurak's hope that the game would destroy the perception of the NFL as the world's best football league, and improve the CFL's in the process. Mazurak is confident the Canadian team could beat the NFL, but at least one former CFL'er isn't.

"It won't happen," said former Saskatchewan Roughrider Gord Barwell. "I think you would find the NFL would not want to take part in such a game."

Barwell is the Canadian director of Athletes in Action in Brampton, which is an organization of former and present athletes, professional and amateur, who travel across the country spreading the word of God. He played pro ball in Saskatchewan from 1964 and retired in 1974.

As a member of the Saskatchewan team Barwell played in three Grey Cups, including the team's only CFL championship win over Ottawa in 1966.

Barwell said the NFL players would likely not be interested in the idea because to them the game will not have enough prestige.

"Down there for their all-star game (which is the Pro Bowl), the players are flown to Hawaii, treated like kings, and are paid on top of that. What are you going to tell the American player: Come to British Columbia during the winter and be given \$500 if you win the game and \$250 if you lose."

"I think you would have to make it pretty inviting for those guys (the NFL players) to come," he said.

One week after the Super Bowl, NFL all-stars gather in Hawaii for the Pro Bowl. Winners receive \$5,000 while losers of the game get \$2,500.

Even if the game were to be held, Barwell is not hopeful the Canadian league could play with the NFL.

"There are some guys in the CFL who could play in the NFL, but when you put their top players against our top players, there is no comparison. It would be like putting the Edmonton Eskimos of three years ago against the Ottawa Rough Riders of today. There is no way our guys could beat them."

Barwell is also critical about just how many people would attend such a game.

"A few years ago Athletes in Action had a flag football game between the CFL and NFL. We worked hard on the project, and planned it out for about three months. Some of the biggest names in the NFL showed up for the game in Toronto, and only 15,000 people showed up. I really don't know how many people the game would draw," he said.

The game would be played under Canadian rules, which Barwell feels might only give the CFL squad a minute advantage.

"That's another reason why some NFL players wouldn't show up," he said. "They don't want to come up and make a fool out of themselves."

But Barwell said he knows why Mazurak and the CFL are looking at such a project.

"Steve is trying to do a job for the players association, and I like that. I've got nine years in the pension, and I give the guys credit for being visionary. I wish this would happen, but I don't think it will," he said.
