A lot of jaws dropped as psychic Carole Matthews spoke to over 40 Halton Hills residents at the Georgetown Public Library on Saturday.

Mrs. Matthews continued and pinned two months of the present year which have been particularly difficult for me. Then with a couple of strokes of the pen and a few quieter words outlined one of the problems I am facing.
