## Y director searching for new program ideas

The new executive director of the Georgetown and District YMCA wants the Y to reach out to young adults, single parents and older adults. Claudette Smith, a

Georgetown resident. was named to the post Oct. 9, replacing John Wood who was transferred to the Y's new Metro Toronto facility on Grosvenor Street. where he is involved in membership sales. "My personal goal is

to increase the visibility of the Georgetown Y in our area by providing service to additional groups in our community that we're not now reaching," Mrs. Smith said.

She expressed concern about the community's older teens and young adults in the 15 to 24 year old range, noting the Y wasn't attracting

"Once they reach the age where they're mobile and can hop on their bike and go places without parental escort, we're losing them,' Mrs. Smith said, JOINING

"Many of the things we're losing them to are super, like hockey and school teams and clubs, but, what I'm really. worrying about are the kids who aren't joining any of those," she said.

Monday, the Georgetown Y will begin a three month feasibility study into providing a youth employment service for that age group. Edward Tooke of Toronto has been hired as a consultant for the study.

He'll be conducting surveys and personal interviews with community and social agencles which would be referring young people

to this potential service. "It's for youth who have some barriers to employment, like social, economic or geographic disadvantages or even the lack of work experience," Mrs. Smith said.

YES The Youth Employment Service (YES) would provide counselling, a hands-on placement and job follow-up, Currently, the program is operating in six other Y's including Bramp-

"We're looking at offering it here by next spring," Mrs. Smith

Another goal Mrs. Smith is working to achieve is making the programs of the Georgetown Y accessible for single parents, especially those who have financial difficulties.

She said she has contacted the public health department and local churches and asked them to make the people they deal with aware Y programs are available to the financially strapped.

"If they want to participate, we'll accept them. Each case is assessed on its own merits. Our Y is here for everybody, and that's a basic Y policy," Mrs. Smith stressed. OVER 50
