The region's new Medical Officer of Health would like to establish dental care for

low income people. Dr. Graham Pollett recently reviewed the current community dentistry program in the region.

His report to regional council recommends low income people who earn more than welfare recipients and less than moderate income people be assured dental care at a centrally located treatment centre or clinic.

As well, Dr. Pollett recommended the region provide dental care for people over 60 years old. However, Dr. Pollett's

recommendations aren't going to be acted on in the 1985 budget. He told The Herald they would require the hiring of a dentist and


