### Fiddler, 91 was active

Norval residents were saddened to hear of the passing of Archie Thomas Fuller of RR2 Norval, who died at Cambridge General Hospital Oct. 30. He was 91 years old.

Mr. Fuller was the beloved father of John in Brampton, Ellen Moses in Kitchener and the late Jean Turner in Burlington. He is remembered by six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Mr. Fuller's many friends and neighbors will remember him for his violin playing. He won his class for the oldest fiddler at the Old Time Fiddlers competition in Shelburne in 1983.

For many years, Mr. Fuller farmed on Mississauga Road, north of Highway 7. He did threshing for his neighbors, first with the steam engine and later gas.

Mr. Fuller was a member of Home Church, the Canadian Legion, Brampton Senior's Club, and the Ontario Steam and Antique Preservers in Milton.

The funeral service was held in Brampton at the Ward Funeral Home. Rev. Walter Ridley conducted the service. Interment was in Georgetown's Greenwood Cemetery.

## Bird lovers enjoy Botanical garden rep

It would seem Georgetown has many bird lovers if the number of people attending the Georgetown and District Horticulture Society on Wednesday evening is any indication and it was indeed an evening for bird lovers.

Nancy Lee-Collibaba of the Royal Botanical Gardens gave a beautiful slide presentation of the many birds we may attract to our gardens.

Cardinals, grosbeaks, juncos, finches, warblers, juncos and many species of sparrows can be attracted to our gardens if we provide the right habitat for them.

By planning our garden and planting the trees, shrubs, vines and flowers that provide

nesting locations, shelter and food and supplementing with a constant supply of seeds, suet, crumbs and other goodies the birds will come.

A supply of water in a shallow container such as a bird bath is necessary to the birds and while this is difficult in the winter it is most desirable during the hot dry days of summer.

Nancy pointed out that while we enjoy watching the birds at our feeder when at home the food supply must be continued when we are away or the birds will suffer.

A quantity of hand-outs were available to those attending giving the names of birds we can hope to attract and the planting material to provide the best habitat. Nancy was thanked by Janice Rumsey for a splendid presentation.

Members were reminded that their memberships are due and their renewal very necessary to maintain the Society.

Pearl and Frank Brown, longtime and still active members of the Society were congratulated on their recent 50th Wedding Anniversary. The last get together for the year will be the Christmas party and pot luck supper Dec. 5.

## Phone survey proposed

Peter Noble of employee services with the Halton Board of Education has proposed a telephone survey for opinions about education in Halton.

Mr. Noble said the telephone survey would have about 50 or 60 questions and would take an estimated 20 minutes to complete. He said approximately 700 homes would have to be contacted in order to achieve 600 public school ratepayers in the Halton region.

Some of the objectives of the proposed survey are to provide data for long range planning, identify public concerns, to identify communication between the general public and the school system, to draw a comparison with other surveys and to explore the further use of public opinion surveys.

The information will be analyzed, interpreted and then fed back to the community.

Trustee Junis Millman was quick to point out

that the public usually don't like telephone surveys.

Mr. Noble cited the telephone survey as more efficient than other methods and thought it could have a positive effect.

Trustee Elaine Riehm said the thought of a telephone survey was "chancey" and added that the 5-7 p.m. time period recommended for making the telephone calls was "just asking for it."

The proposed questionnaire is expected to be in a multiple choice format with a space at the end for comments from ratepayers.

Board members asked for financial costs and further information on the proposed questions in the survey.

It was suggested Sheridan College students from the marketing department courses may be a good group of people to involve in the survey.

Action on the recommendation is expected to take place at the board's Dec. 13 meeting.
