#### More deals possible with Jays

As far as Jim Ridley is concerned, the Toronto Blue Jays are not through making player deals just yet.

Recently the American League East team traded team MVP Dave Collins and infielder Alfredo Griffin to Oakland A's for reliever Bill Caudill. Ridley said he was not surprised the trade itself happened, but he was taken by the players involved.

"I knew trades were coming because of the problems with the bullpen, but I was surprised Dave Collins was involved.

"I think it will be a good trade if something more happens. I would say between now and spring training something will happen."

While Ridley was surprised Collins was involved the said he thought Alfredo Griffin or Damaso Garcia would not be with the club this

"It was 50-50 as to who it would be," he said. 'Griffin is a steady influence while Garcia has a good bat if he can stay healthy."

But the Stewarttown Public School teacher and Blue Jays scout said the trade will help Oakland. The A's lost speedster Ricky Henderson this year when he was traded to New York Yankees, and Ridley feels Collins can help compensate for that loss.

"I feel that today the home run is a valuable commodity, but I would put more value on having men on base who can scare people. A healthy Damaso Garcia and Dave Collins can do that.

"I don't think Oakland is losing much speed with Collins." The departure of Griffin will open the door

for youngster Tony Fernandez, who for the past two years has played in the shadow of Griffin. A regular spot in the infield will now be his at spring training.

The fact that he will have a spot almost assured will help Fernandez, Ridley said.

While the Jays have apparently solved their problems in the bullpen with the acquisition of Caudill, they do have a problem with the designated bitter position. Last year Cliff Johnstone was the man Toronto relied upon for right-handed power from the DH position.

However, he and the Jays could not agree on a contract, so Johnstone, who was a free agent, signed a contract with Texas Rangers.

"If he is healthy, Fernandez can make all the plays in the infield." Ridley said, "1 think this will only do things to help him going into spring training being number one, and knowing the only way he will lose his spot is if he does not play

well."



JIM RIDLEY "We do need right-handed power," Ridley said. "I don't think we saw the same Willie Mays Aikens last year that we've seen in years gone by. He's playing winter ball, and from what I hear he

is doing well." To compound that fact is Toronto was planning to have Collins play the DH role this year, but that was all washed up with the trade with Oakland.

For a while Toronto was in the running for relief ace Bruce Sutter, who became a free agent after his contract with St. Louis Cardinals expired. Sutter eventually signed a multi-million dollar contract with Atlanta Braves. Last year Toronto narrowly missed out in signing former New York Yankee ace Goose Gossage, who is now a San Diego Padre. One reason American players are hesitant in coming to Canada is the weather.

But that situation could be remedied, Ridley

said. "I think a dome stadium is important because players don't want to go out in the middle of April and play in a bit of a blizzard. Toronto had the highest bid with Gossage, but he dld not want to play in the cold weather. Last year San Diego went to the World Series with Gossage."

So now Toronto is left with the possibility of starting this coming season without three of last year's starting players.

"It certainly hurts when you lose three front line players like that, but I know Pat Gillick (Jays GM and V.P.) is not happy with the pitching situation. Right now we have a large quota of pitchers."

There was talk Toronto could solve last year's horrendous bultpen limitations by making starter Dave Stieb a reliever. Ridley feels that was a figment of the Toronto media's imagination, and

will not happen. "It is a delicate thing to do," he said. "You've got to give a reliever time to toughen up his arm.

"The question is can Stieb go out and throw 30-35 pitches every third day. It is not an easy thing to do.

"I don't think the Toronto organization thought about doing that for very long, if they did, it was for about five minutes."
