## Law change blamed for home closure

D and G Care Ltd., operators of a group home for native children who have run into problems with the law is empty and so far in debt its owner knows no way to save it.

In a telephone interview David Stanley said between Dec. 21 and Jan. 2 all 10 of his residents were removed from the house on Highway 25, one mile south of Acton.

Although his home had the highest occupancy rate of any home of its sort in the province, according to a civil servant with the Ministry of Community and Social Services (COMSOC), Stanley said no new residents were referred to him when his previous residents were removed.

"In November I had five kids on a waiting list," he said. "Over the next three weeks those kids disappeared and the memos (recalling the residents) began com-

On a case-by-case basis, Stanley said, it is possible some of the residents could have been ready to return home but as a group the decision to remove them

was "Indefensible." "It's inconceivable that all our kids were cured at the same time," he said. "It's also inconcelvable that there would be no new kids to come to us when they

Stanley believes at least part of the problem stems from differences between the Young Offenders Act and the Juvenile Delinquents

Under the JDA, people with problems could be sent for treatment when they were convicted of a crime. There is no treatment component in the YOA, Stanley said.

He feels some government official decided treatment of the residents had to be stopped because the new act was in force and because he

only handled native children he suffered more than other homes. Compounding his prob-

lems in October, a fire in the home forced him to remove his residents to Manitoulin Island. The fire did about \$70,000 damage, but so far the insurance company has only authorized about \$12,000 worth of repairs.

Stanley said he understands the dickering which is going on with the company is standard
