

Herald Stall Councillor Pam Sheldon was pleased Monday night with the region's revisions of the Halton Rural Industrial Land

Needs Study. "I'm pleased to see the region thought so highly of our recommendations to them that they have agreed with practically everything we said," Coun. Sheldon said. "It really looks like we

wrote it." The study, prepared by Peter Barnard Asso-'ciates, looked at future industrial growth in the region's rural areas. It was presented to regional council in December 1983, then circulated for comments to interested groups, agencies and departments, including the region's four municipalities.

In the summer, Halton Hills councillors sent off their comments, many of which were incorporated in the recently released revised report. .

The report recognizes the shortage of available industrial land in the town and places a priority on resolving that. Acknowledging there

is limited interim urban industrial development capability in Halton Hills, the study recommends lands within the new urban area boundary (north of Sideroad 10 in Georgetown south) be developed on water only, until the Georgetown sewage treatment plant has been expanded.

This recommendation depends on there being sufficient water supply in Georgetown, which is currently under study.




