For Halton schools

5.5% budget rise proposed

Members of Halton's board of education finance committee poured over the proposed '85 school budget page by page Monday night.

Under trustee Bill Harrison as chairman and trustee Bev Vola as vice-chairman, the committee will be reviewing a total budget proposal of \$158,576,000.

That's a 5.5 per cent increase over last year. The committee first met Feb. 4 and there were discussions on adjustments required, limitations the administration has to work with

and where the differences are from last year, said Ron Warren, assistant superintendent of business services.

The board won't be receiving any information from the province about their share of funding until late February or early March, said Ron Warren.

"It's questionable whether the province will come through with anything much better than last year," Mr. Warren said.

Last year provincial grants went up eight tenths of one per cent, or \$53,238.

Sit-N-Bull trial will resume Feb. 25

An Acton pub, charged with allowing drunkenness on its premises, will return to court Feb. 25 for the third day of its trial.

KAAI Investments Ltd., operating the Sit-N-Bull Pub, Mill Street, Acton, was charged after a near riot in July.

The incident took place July 4 during the performance of a featured band.

When Halton Regional Police officers visited the pub they felt one-third to one-half the patrons were drunk.

Sgt. Michael Eacrett estimated there were 300 patrons in the pub when he visited it following a

call by other officers.

He saw only two doormen on duty and felt, considering the number of people involved, there should have been at least five experienced men available for crowd control.

There was a crowd milling about outside the pub, many with bottles or glasses in their hands, he said, adding he was concerned both with the drunkenness inside the pub and with the drunken crowd outside it.

Patrons were walking around with drinks, drinking on the dance floor and hanging over the upper floor railing with drinks in their hands, he said. The music was very loud and there was a lot of yelling and profanity.

"It was like a zoo in there," he said.

Sgt. Eacrett said the problems really began when a drunken patron started a fight when he was being ejected.

During the disturbance which followed the ejection of Jack Evans, a large crowd poured out of the pub into the street.

A major portion of that crowd was "highly intoxicated," Sgt. Eacrett said, adding objects were thrown at cars and windows and street signs were broken.

Sgt. Eacrett said about 14 officers were called in from Acton, Georgetown, Milton and Oakville to quell the disturbance and 11 people were arrested. A total of

Transportation study

It's been a long time in the making, and cost an extra \$5,000, but it looks like the town will have an official Transportation study by March end.

Town engineer Bob Austin brought the good news to councillors Monday night.

Originally to cost \$35,000, the one-year extension of the project, with a report on Sideroad 15 Concession 8 and more detail on the Wildwood Road area raised the cost to \$40,000.

Anti-drinking signs might be removed

The sign proclaiming Halton Hills to be an anti-drinking and driving community is due to come down March 14.

Located on Trafalgar Road near Sideroad 15, the sign was put up by the anti-drinking and driving committee Jan. 14 for a two month period.

Coun. Pam Sheldon, chairman of the committee that bought the sign and got regional permission to put it up, wants the sign to be up permanently.

The region granted permission for it to be up for only two months.

"The signs are, in fact, the largest and most visible focus of the whole campaign," she told councillors Monday night.

"We felt the cost to erect the signs were prohibitive if they're only for two months," Coun. Sheldon said. A second sign is up on Guelph Street, at the top of Norval hill, as you enter Georgetown.

"This is the only town in all of Canada, with the exception of Red Deer, Alberta, that has such a sign," she noted.

Coun. Mike Armstrong said he had some reservations about the signs staying up "til Lord knows when".

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Funds rejected for hygienist

Halton doesn't intend to bow to provincial law when it comes to dental health.

That's the stance regional councillors took last week when the medical officer of health informed them that they are contravening the law by not having a dental hygienist visiting schools to teach dental health.

Regional chairman Peter Pomeroy said he wants Premier Frank Miller to reconsider this mandatory requirement that there be dental screening examinations, noting Halton is having trouble finding the money to put such a program into operation.

Halton Hills councillors Mike Armstrong, Dave Whiting, Jake Kulken and Mayor Russ Miller voted against budgeting for a hygienist in 1985. Coun. John McDonald was absent.

A hygienist was estimated to cost the region \$3,512.

Computer planning

An updated version of a five year plan for the use of computers in Halton schools will be presented to the Halton board of Education tomorrow.

The Computer Advisory Committee was established to assist in monitoring the expansion and use of computers in Halton schools.

Some of the projects worked on by the committee include: analyzing data on student demand for computer courses; request input from a variety of interested individuals and groups and reviewing the method of implementing computers in the elementary schools.

The five year plan lists a series of goals and objectives for different school levels.

Dumping garbage

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Coun. Mulkwich said the report, co-ordinated by consultants Walker Wright Young Associates Ltd. leaves a lot of questions that have to be examined in detail.

"I've watched enough westerns to know that when you're in something for a long haul, and you're going through a swamp, you keep your powder dry," he said.

The councillor noted despite complex engineering and technology to establish a regional Energy From Waste plant to incinerate garbage, there was substantial opposition. Regional council came to the conclusion there were no good sites for an Energy From Waste plant either, Coun. Mulkwich said.

"The reality is we had no choice regarding EFW," Coun. Mulkwich said.
