#### Washrooms above budget

The region's property manager Vince Geraghty told members of the finance and administration committee last week that \$17,500 was the lowerst quote he could get on the work to

II was back in November that regional councillors accepted the quotation of K.B.S. for the supply and installation of equipment to monitor long distance calls made by regional phones.

The equipment identifies the extension making the call and the destination of the call. Records and Informa-

tion Supervisor Maurice Traynor has cancelled the balance of the order and the purchasing manager has been trying

to recover the \$1.805 deposit. As well, he's trying to find buyers for the central processing

unit the region still has. Bell Canada says its quotation, made last November, for a similar unit is still valid. It was the second lowest quote and the region is moving to buy this DART system.

The DART system tells the extension making the call, the destination and the date and time of the call, the duration and the approximate cost.

Chief Administrative Officer Dennis Perlin Is hopeful the region will recover the cost of the DART system and the \$1,805 lost on the K.B.S. system within two years, with savings on the long distance bills.



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
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
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
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
