### Students use museum

Who goes to Halton regional museum? Students and more students.

Last February, there were no school visitations, but since an educational interpreter was hired by the museum in May, school visits have gone up over 220 per cent, curator Ernie Buchner said.

Before hiring the interpreter, the bulk of students coming to the museum were from Peel. Now, it's 70 per cent from Halton and 30 per cent from other areas.

Mr. Buchner said approximately 30 per cent of students come from Burlington, 25 per cent from Oakville, 10 per cent from Halton Hills and 10 per cent from Milton.

Most of the programs have been on the request of schools, not as a result of promotions by the museum, Mr. Buchner said.

## Agencies make requests for financial support

Local agencies have spread their palms for regional social service grants.

Among those looking for a grant for 1985 were: North Halton Distress Centre, Parent Information Exchange, Acton Social Service and Information Centre, Halton Recovery House, North Halton Hospice, North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded, St. John Ambulance of Halton Hills, and Halton Helping Hands.

The Distress Centre is asking for \$8,650.90. Last year they asked the region for \$3,990 and didn't get anything, because they had surplus funds in the bank.

The centre telephone is manned on a 24-hour basis, giving confidential support to the lonely, distressed and suicidal. As well, it gives information on community agencies, and seniors' activities.

The Distress Centre budget is \$13,578 for 1985. There is one part-time staff, the director. Last year, there were 6,805 calls received.

North Halton Hospice, a volunteer organization which offers support to patients and families facing a terminal illness, is asking the region for \$2,200 towards their 1985 budget of \$8,800.

The four year old organization received \$2,100 last year from the region.

North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded is asking for a regional grant of \$15,200. The Association got a grant of \$14,470 last year from the region.

With the money, the mentally handicapped are helped to develop their potential and become participating and contributing members of the community.

The Acton Social Services and Information Centre operated last year with a \$42,190 budget. They got a regional grant of \$28,820.

This year, they're asking for a \$28,500 grant from the region.

The Information Centre co-ordinates health and social services in the community and provides space for regional and provincial agencies.

Halton Recovery House in Hornby is asking for a regional grant of \$5,850 which is five per cent more than what the rehabilitation home for male alcoholics got last year.

Recently moved to a home in Hornby, the Recovery House has a 1985 budget of \$144,426.

The St. John Ambulance in Halton Hills has requested a regional grant of \$420. Last year they got a one time start-up grant of \$1,500 and \$400 as an operating grant.

St. John Ambulance is a volunteer first aid service to the community.

Halton Helping Hands, which provides home help for the frail, elderly, and physically disabled, is asking for \$70,461; three per cent more than the \$68,554 they got last year.

A new parent self-help group in the community, is asking for \$1,600; Parent Information Exchange (North Halton) Inc. helps parents develop and improve parenting skills.

## Concerns for mill pollution

Halton Flour Milling Inc. on Acton's Mill Street East plans to expand its plant and double its staff.

Recently, it received permission from the Halton Hills Committee of Adjustment to enlarge.

The move will upgrade the quality of the mill and cut down on its air pollution, company lawyer Walter Sopinka said.

A neighbor directly behind the mill expressed concern about pollution increasing. Vicki Bridgen said she wants to be satisfied there will be proper control of the pollution coming from the mill.

Real estate agent Glenda Hughes said that when the Bridgen home was up for sale, one of the main reasons it was difficult to sell was that the pollution from the mill was "extremely severe".

Not only does the dust collect on cars outside, it gets into the house. Doors and windows can't be left open, Mrs. Hughes said.

Mrs. Bridgen was advised that a Certificate of Compliance must be obtained from the Ministry of Environment, before the project can go ahead.

A consultant to the company, P. Nelstrop said the new plant will cut pollution down. He said the processing plant will be filtered through baghouses which are 99.9 per cent efficient and will be an improvement from an environmental point of view.

There are currently 12 people employed by the mill. When the proposed addition is completed, staff is expected to be doubled.

Structure engineer Richard Dray said the company was going to put up a steel shell and covering up board that is there now. Silos will be painted to match or at least be complimented by the building.
