Steve Frost accepts Photoart top prize

"I was impressed by the technical quality," was the way one judge described the work of Photoart '85 winner Steve Frost.

Judge Paul Savoie was one of three people asked to evaluate and pick a winner from the works of 37 photographers.

Last Wednesday night was the opening of Photoart '85, an exhibition of color and black and white photos taken by local camera bugs.

Mr. Frost's color photos were very illuminating and each of the three were quite strong, Mr. Savoie said. The richness of his two black and white photos was very pleasing aesthetically, he said. "The decision among the judges was unanimous."

Mr. Savoie was impressed with the range of subjects entered in the exhibit and how photographers were able to make the photos

interesting with what they had to work with. However, some of the entries could have been improved by having the work done by a custom lab, he said.

There was a good range of nature shots, but not much in the way of photojournalism, documentary-type or architecture photography, he said.

But Mr. Savoie noted: "It's not the subject that makes or breaks a photograph, it's how it's taken."

"I'd like to see more black and white photos next year," he said. David Bianchi won an award of merit for his shot entitled "Bruce Springsteen and the E-Street Band".

Tom Gibson was honored for a photo entitled "Barn, Surrey, B.C.". Nancy Murphy was a recipient of an award for her work called "In Xian, China".

A photo of a seagull

was selected for honors, taken by Patricia Stanley. Graham Tyler received an award of merit for "Surfin' USA". Honorable mentions went to Frank Anthony, Terry Anthony, Ken Brambley, Peter Deloy and Harold Mann. Trophies were donated by Benson and Hedges.
