

### **Pro tryout** haunting Lowe

Little did Darren Lowe know trying to realize what every hockey playing youth in Canada only dreams about could cause so many problems.

Lowe was a member of the 1984 Canadian Olympic team that narrowly missed claiming a medal at the '84 Games. After the Olympics Lowe ioined Pittsburgh Penguins of the National Hockey League on an amateur tryout.

The stipulation here was Lowe could play up to 10 games with Pittsburgh on a tryout basis. If the Penguins liked what they saw, they then had the option of offering Lowe a professional

If the Penguins figured Lowe could not crack their lineup, then they could simply release him. But Lowe would still be an amateur player because he did not sign a professional contract and play in a professional league.

However, because he played in the National Hockey League, the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union (CIAU) deemed him ineligible for this season. Lowe had planned on returning to play for University of Toronto Varsity Blues, where he played last year.

So as an alternative, Lowe decided he would play with Georgetown Chrysler Raiders of the Ontario Senior "A" Hockey League the remainder of the season. But his brief stint in Pittsburgh is returning to haunt him once again.

Last week the Raiders received two protests involving Cam Botting and Lowe. The first one was from Cambridge Hornets and the second came from Collingwood Shipbuilder's Friday night in Georgetown's 9-1 romp at the Alcott Arena.

Last year Botting played two games with Erie of the Atlantic Coast League, before coming to Georgetown: He signed before the Dec. 31: cutline date, aos was not deemed an import last

Both protests came as the result of a league meeting Feb. 18 in Woodstock where discussion of the league rule on the amount of reinstated pros allowed to play in a game arose. The league rules state all teams are allowed to sign six ex-pros or university players, who are deemed imports, but

only play three in a game. Raider officials interprete the rule as meaning any three can play any given game, but the other teams in the senior league now say that rule means teams can only play the first three imports signed. Last year Lowe played university hockey, and could be regarded as an import except he signed before the Dec. 31 cutline date, which means had be signed after that date, be would be deemed an import player, and would be involved in the three allowed to play.

But what other team officials are claiming is because Lowe played in Pittsburgh last year, he should be deemed a pro, and therefore should not be able to play until the Raiders are out of league playoffs because he was not one of the first three imports signed.

The whole situation of making Lowe a proinfuriates Raider coach-general manager Gil

"Not for one minute will I count Darren Lowe as being a pro. After the Olympics were over Darren Lowe had an eight-game amateur tryout with Pittsburgh Penguins, but he was still na Oh mpian." As for Lowe himself, he is letting the team

management handle this one. "I'm not even worrying about it," be said.

"I was worried the first time it happened but now "For sure I'm an amateur. My interpretati-

on of a pro is one who is making a living playing bockey. I still live with my parents and don't have a lot of money." As far as Lowe is concerned, he said the

whole situation is being used by the Senior A teams as a ploy.

"I think our team has been going well for the last 12 games and this is an excuse to try and rattle us. I don't think anything will come of it.

"Any person who has played hockey all their life, when you have a chance to go to the NHL, you will go. I'm disappointed I didn't stay, but for the experiently given to me. I have no regrets."
