

Don't tell your kid he's a bum: expert

Norman 'Panzica chattenged a large adult audience to examine, their methods of parenting in their efforts to save their children from drug addiction.

He talked about teenage drug abuse at the Georgetown District High School last Wednesday night.

Underlining a compassionate and often controversial discussion was an appeal to parents to become more responsible role models.

"How many times have you said at the dinner table that all politicians are crooked or that teachers stop working at 3 o'clock and sleep all summer?" Mr. Panzica asked.

"You must remember that every time you blame the cop for your parking ticket you are cutting down knowledge

of logical consequence." Children are effectively "spitting in the eye" of authority with parental make them, stop taking consent and according to Mr. Panzica statistics have proven that this increasing disrespect corelates directly to ahigher frequency of drug .

"The last thing any kid of any age needs is a parent lacking in social conscience", he said.

Social scientists have theorized that a person's behavior takes direction from the expectations of others in the same social group.

The theory is called cultural conditioning, and it is a theory to which Mr. Panzica subscribes. "If you tell a 13 year old boy he is a burn and that he will never amount to anything he will make it come true," he explained.

Youthful self-esteem

must be protected and enhanced at all costs. "Supervise your children", he advised, "but don't embarrass or humiliate them...Anything you can do that teaches your kid that his behavior influences what happens, I'm telling you as a matter of research judgement is a specific preventative of drug
