Main-Maple traffic stop

Perhaps this month, the traffic lights proposed for Maple Avenue and Main Street, and the flashing beacon for Maple and Dexrex Boulevard in Georgetown will finally be instolled.

It was back in November that regional councillors voted to accept the tender of a Waterloo, Ontario, company for the installation of the traffic signals by the end of last year.

However, the contractor had problems getting delivery of the poles, director of public works Bob Moore told The Herald. "They weren't delive-

red til February," he said. The traffic signals were budgeted for in 1984. They cost the regi-

was sung. The offering that was taken supports the work, programs and concerns of Women's Inter Church Council of Canada.

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
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
