The Inner Stage is presenting this classic favorite by James M. Barrie with its quartet of performers. Through the technique of transformation, two actors, with a whirlwind of acrobatics, create the Lost Boys and Pirates in delightful individual characterizations.

The flight materializes through the lyrical beauty of the dance, and Tinkerbell emerges through the inner stage of the audience's imagination, together with the delicate sounds of the Glockenspiel.

The quarter completes with the magical

realm of Peter returning to the Darling home for his shadow and finding Wendy. Their sharing of exciting adventures, love and devotion proves that plains of existence do touch despite appearances.

This bitter-sweet fairy tale has been performed in theatres in England and North America since the early 1900s, with the title role played by such stars as Maude Adams, Evalde Gallenne, Marilyn Miller, Mary Martin and Sandy Duncan.

It speaks to us of the need to bridge the gap between adult and child.

The Inner Stage in its performances and workshops strives to awaken the child within each member of its audience. By opening to the magic existing in all aspects of life, this child can become a vital force within each one of us.

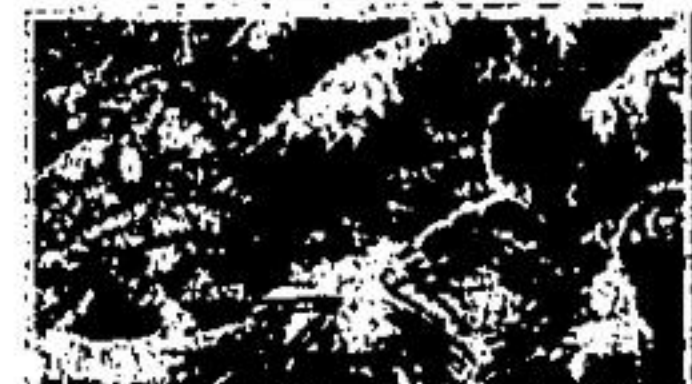
