Track Club

Running hints

Let's look at new routes

After a person has been running for a few years, or even a few months, it can become a little boring running the same routes day after day. The Track Club therefore would like to share with you some of our favourites.

If you are still limited to 20 or 30 minute runs, you pretty well have to stay within town limits. Its always nice to run a loop rather than an out and back course. One of our old stand-bys is the Delrex route. A nice half-hour run can be accomplished by starting at the corner of Guelph St. and Mountainview Road and running south on Mountainview. Turning east on Delrex Blvd., run right out to Guelph and cross to Armstrong Ave. Follow Armstrong all the way to Mountainview and back to Guelph where you started. Of course you can start anywhere on this loop that you want and put in your run.

Another run we do that is a sequence of three progressively larger loops starts at Maple Ave. and Guelph St. If you want to do a short run, head west on Maple to Trafalgar Road and turn south, proceeding through Stewarttown to 15 Sideroad then east to Main St. South Run up Main St. and you will be back on Maple.

The two other longer loops of which were referred to also follow Maple out to Trafalgar. Cross over Trafalgar heading west on 17th Sideroad and either head south on the 5th or 4th lines depending on how far you wish to run. Come back into town via 15th Sideroad and up Main St. again. The nice thing about these three loops is you don't have to make a final decision on the distance until you are out there. Its also nice because once you leave town there is not a lot of traffic.

Surely most of you who have been running for any length of time have a great variety of routes. Maybe these will add a little spice to your exercise.
