## Highland Games ask for \$4,500 grant

Plagued by financial difficulties, the Speyside Highland Games may get a \$4,500 grant from the town this year. Last week, councillors agreed to consider that amount at their 1985 budget meetings. The budget is expected to be made public within the next 40 weeks, as final cutbacks are hammered out.

Games president A.E. Macintosh of Georgetown said the local games are threatened with extinction because of financial difficulties. For the last three years, expenses have been increasing and the turnout decreasing, he said. Games treasurer Clark Hooton said the games have been run "pretty much on a shoestring" and lost \$2,000 last year. They lost money in 1983 also. This year's games' budget is \$14,000, which Mr. Hooton said was a modest budget.

Dr. Macintosh, with the support of four fellow organizers of the games, presented his "tale of woe", about the lack of community support for the games. He said local people are coming out less and less to the games which feature Scottish bagpipers and kilned dancers. "We've been negligent in supplying items of local attraction," the games president said. Promotion and publicity for the games have been deficient locally, Dr. Macintosh said. Welcoming ideas on what changes could be made to improve local attendance, he said he would like more support from the businesses and institutions in Halton Hills. "We need advice and help, so there is a general excitement and awareness that the Highland Games are being put on," Dr. Macintosh said.

He said the people directly involved with the competitions are still supporting the games. They're the hard core games fans who travel from game to game and they call the Georgetown games the best because of the atmosphere, Dr. Macintosh said. He said organizers are considering going from the "regular" games with a modest budget and program, to the "championship supreme" category of games which attract more American and international quality contenders. Organizer Keith Spicer said such a move would attract more visitors to the games and more of the quality bands and dancers. There are currently five championship supreme games held in Ontario: at Fergus, Maxville, Cambridge, Sarnia and Ottawa. Points gained by competitors at the championship games are recognized in general American championship. Putting on a championship game would require a \$26,000 budget, Mr. Hooton said. It means higher judges' fees, prize money, Pipers Association fee and pipe band travel expenses. Dr. Macintosh said that "the long term future of the games requires that we go the extra step and establish a championship supreme category." This year's games are to be held June 8, and notices have already been sent to games participants of where the championship games are to be held, so it's too late to hold a championship game in Georgetown this summer, Mr. Spicer said. The organizers will be concentrating their energies on improving publicity and sponsorship of the games. March 22, a Highland Ball is to be held at Holy Cross Hall.

### Games funding helpers

The organizers of the Georgetown Highland Games are going to get a helping hand from a newly appointed committee of Mayor Russ Miller, and Couns. Phil Carney and Mike Armstrong. The trio will help Games volunteers find outside funding for the annual event.
