# Chinguacousy wins GMHA event

A Hollywood movie producer could not have asked for a more dramatic ending.  
Tournament MVP, Daniel Naumovsky scored with 54 seconds left to play to lift Chinguacousy to a 4-3 win over Richmond Hill Saturday. The win gave the Chinguacousy team the overall championship at the Georgetown Minor Hockey Association International Bantam Tournament.  
Chinguacousy trailed 3-1 late in the second period, but needed but 41 seconds to tie the game. Jason Greyerblehl scored with 15 seconds left in

the second period to make it 3-2 Richmond Hill. Only 26 seconds into the third period Jason Feildery (voted most sportsmanlike player), scored to tie the game 3-3.  
The loss tarnished a fine goaltending performance by Richmond Hills' Jeff Harrison. Harrison was named the top goaltender of the tournament after the game.  
Chinguacousy won the "A" division (for OMHA AAA teams) while Richmond topped the competition in the "B" division (OMHA AA). Richmond Hill defeated "D" division champs Oshawa (OMHA B and BB) while

Chinguacousy thumped "C" division champs Waterloo (OMHA A).  
Steve Koczowski had the other goal for the winners while Bill Hodges, Dan Peterson and Adrian Adams scored for Richmond Hill.  
"I keep telling our players just because we're a AAA team doesn't mean a good AA team can't beat us," Chinguacousy and top tournament coach Vern Woolridge said after the game. "They played a good game, but I thought we lingered a little bit."  
Winning hasn't been much of a surprise for the Chinguacousy squad who have come home victorious in 77 of their 87

games this year. Included in that figure are four tournament championships.  
"In between the second and third periods I told the boys we can't go home saying we lost to Richmond Hill, not a team of this calibre," Woolridge said. "This team here is the best in the Chinguacousy system now."  
A close, exciting finish was the icing on the cake as far as tournament chairman Wayne Pries was concerned.  
"You couldn't have

scripted it any better," he said.  
Pries said all went smoothly in the week-long event, and the success of the event should be shared on a group level.  
"There was a lot of co-operation between the executive, hockey moms and everybody in general. It was a total group effort."  
Being in the arena for 7 a.m. every day and staying there until 11 p.m., can be a tiring chore, but despite that, Pries is not totally glad it is all over.  
"It has been hectic, but it has been an emotional high this week too," he said.

"It was nice to have St. Mike's here for the final time. They are folding because the Metropolitan Toronto Hockey League says if you are to be a member you must have a full system. St. Mike's is a high school and only has teams for the ages of their students. As a result you are saying goodbye to 70 years of hockey."  
Now the GMHA will organize the provincial "AA" midget championships slated for April 19-20-21.  
"We're strictly responsible for the organizing of it, and once we get started it will be a manpower thing," Pries said.

## Georgettes change name of ball team

The Georgetown Georgettes are no longer. The Ladies Inter-County softball team has changed its name to the G-T Royals, and is currently looking for a coach and new players for the upcoming season.  
Team spokesperson Janet MacKay said the reason behind the name change is an attempt to project a new outlook for the team.  
"Last year Georgetown competed with Acton, Hillsburgh, Erin, Eden Mills, Glen Williams and Orangeville. Georgetown finished fifth in the league."  
This year, the Erin team is said to be having difficulty in getting a team together, and might fold before the season begins in May.  
Last year the club did not have an official sponsor, although Georgetown did receive some money from the Armstrong Insurance business and wore their sweaters. This year MacKay said the club will be a merchant team, meaning each player will be responsible for obtaining an individual

sponsor as well as paying \$25 to play.  
MacKay estimates the cost for running such a team could easily exceed \$2,500 for one season. Included in that estimate are uniforms, paying for the use of a lighted field, umpires and equipment.  
One of the major moves the team will have to make is the naming of a coach for this season. Last year Dave and Judy Piper coached, but this year don't want to assume the duties due to family interests. However, both will still help out with the team.

## Wrestler must pay own way to go on trip

A Georgetown wrestler will accompany the Thorold Wrestling Club on its tour of Sweden next month despite not having a sponsor.  
Fourteen-year-old Bill Murphy was invited to go with the team before Christmas when he received a written invitation from coach Nat Brigante. However, he was looking for a sponsor to help defer the costs, which will amount to about \$1,000.  
No sponsor was obtained, but Murphy's family has decided to provide the financial backing in order for the Georgetown District High School team member to go on the trip.  
"It will be a tremendous experience for him," said mother Tryphena. "As soon as we found out Bill had the opportunity of going to Sweden we made up our minds he would be going regardless."  
Murphy's flight will cost \$650 with an additional \$60 being required for touring expenses. Added to this will be Murphy's grocery and souvenir money.  
The Thorold team will be leaving April 25 and will return May 8. Murphy and the team will take part in wrestling competitions as well as training sessions with the Swedish athletes.  
But the trip won't be all fun and no school work. Mrs. Murphy said the wrestlers will be required to do at least three hours of school work a day while there.  
"I still have to go over to the high school and have papers signed for the work he'll have to do," she said.  
Murphy is a Grade nine student, and recently finished his first year of high school wrestling with the Rebel team. He qualified for the provincial championships, and finished 10th in the 84-pound class (38-kilograms).  
He is quite excited about the upcoming trip. "I had no idea I'd be going anywhere when I started," he said. "This is just a bonus."  
"The OFSAA meet (provincial championship) was really different for me because there weren't any bad wrestlers and I learned a lot," Murphy added.  
Also, Murphy won five gold medals in tournaments the Rebel team took part in this year.

# DRG juveniles closing in on OMHA final

Georgetown's DRG Stationery Juveniles are just one game from an Ontario Minor Hockey Association (OMHA) final berth.  
The team recorded two weekend wins over Riverside to take a 2-0 lead in the best-of-five series. Saturday there the locals scored an

impressive 6-0 win and returned to the Alcott Arena Sunday afternoon for a 6-2 win.  
The third game will go Friday tentatively at 10 p.m. in Riverside, but both teams are working to have the game played at an earlier time.  
Sunday fine goaltending and staying away from penalties in the third period powered the

locals to the win. The score was tied 2-2 after two periods, but four goals in the final period put Georgetown ahead to stay.  
Goalie Mike McNiven was sharp, particularly in the first two periods of the game. McNiven also recorded the shutout Saturday night.  
The only thing Georgetown has lost so far in

this series is the coin toss to decide who would hold the home game advantage, which went to Riverside.  
Georgetown coach Howard Murphy says he is not concerned about winning the series at home. He just wants it over as quickly as possible.  
"I want it to end there Friday night," he said.

"I don't want to give them a break. We were down 2-0 in our last series with Stoney Creek and came back."  
The Riverside team hails from Windsor, which meant a lengthy trip home Saturday night. In fact, the locals didn't arrive in Georgetown until 2 a.m. Sunday morning, and had to play at 2:30 p.m. that same

day.  
Saturday Paul Basha and Jay Anderson led the way with two goals each. Hank Hamilton and Greg Roberts added singles. Sunday Mark Webster had two goals while Ray DeSouza, Craig Robertson, Howie Oram, and Pat McCarthy had singles.  
"Every player has

given 100 per cent and did what was asked of them. Our goaltending has been very good. Mike McNiven has been outstanding," he said.  
If necessary, the fourth game will be played Saturday evening at the Alcott Arena, starting at 7:30 p.m. The fifth game would go back to Riverside Sunday.

## All-star balloting something to be desired

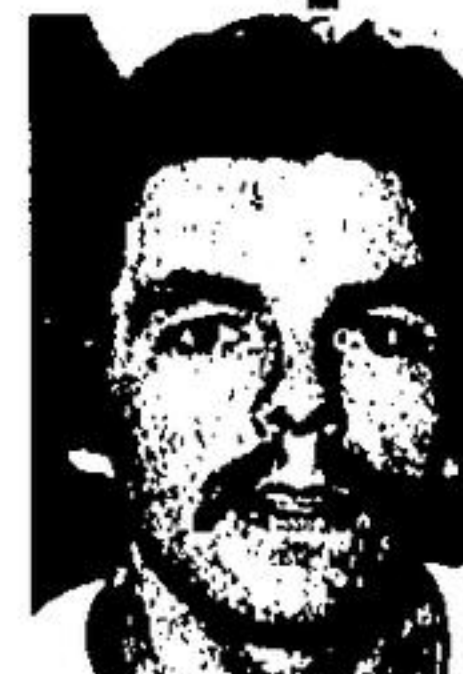

first team by Flamboro's Ken Ellacott, who was also named the league MVP. Ellacott was second behind Thompson in average (3.79), third in minutes played, third in goals allowed and shutouts.  
Even more disturbing was Thompson was beaten out of second team honors by Petrolia's Larry Lucas. Lucas was ninth in minutes played (1067), tied for third in shutouts and fourth overall in goals-allowed per game (4.37).  
Now what does Thompson have to do in order to receive just recognition? Cambridge set a league record for shutouts (Doug Chessel had one before he left for the International league) and Thompson set an individual mark with four.  
The league saw fit to award the first-team centre spot to Cambridge's John Vandergriendt, who was tied with Flamboro's Bob Peace for the scoring race. Peace, like Vandergriendt a centre too, was named to the second team squad.  
Seeing Ellacott was named MVP, it is no surprise he was the first-team goalie. But why was Lucas named the second-team netminder when Thompson clearly deserved the selection more?  
Lucas might be a fine goalie, but Thompson

made a more significant contribution this season, and should have been rewarded for it.  
The same argument can be made for the selection of Collingwood's Rick Green to the second team as a defenceman. Green appeared in just 13 of Collingwood's 40 games this year and should not have been given an all-star selection.  
A more deserving player would have been Georgetown's Peter Sturgeon, who played in more games (37), had more goals (14 to 4), had more assists (26 to 10) and overall scoring points (40 to 14) than Green. It is also very safe to say Sturgeon had more of a dominating presence in the Senior "A" league than Green did.  
In fact, the other second team defenceman was Flamboro's Jim Turkiewicz who played in 27 games, had four goals, 18 assists for 22 points, all inferior marks to Sturgeon's.  
Why Sturgeon was left off the all-star list is a question that has no suitable answer.  
For that matter, why was there not a member from the Georgetown team on either team. The Raiders were tops in goals scored and second in goals allowed, and having Sturgeon on the second team would have been the best possible selection from the Raiders for an all-star position.

He is a fine defenceman who has the ability to dominate a game with his offensive skills as well as sound defensive play. Yet, Rick Green was named ahead of him.  
Why? That's a good question.  
The Senior "A" league prides itself as being a competitive circuit made up of quality players that provide fans with entertaining hockey. If such is the case, the all-star teams should be made up of the best players, not ones who are undeserving of all-star mention. When such inadequacies occur in the all-star selection, one cannot help but shake his head and wonder.  
EDITOR'S NOTES—The first team all-star squad was made up of Flamboro's Ellacott in goal. Dundas has league rookie of the year and top defenceman Tom Searle while Flamboro's Wayne Smith was the other. Vandergriendt was at centre with teammate Todd Stark on left wing and Flamboro's Dave Peace on right wing.  
Lucas was the second team goalie with Green and Turkiewicz on defence. Flamboro's Bob Peace was a centre while Collingwood's Tim Colley was on left wing and Cambridge's Carl Reinhart and Petrolia's Gord Brooks tied for right wing.
