Midnight strikes for Cinderella LePage team

The team had qualified for the "D" division final in the Georgetown Minor Hockey Association's bantam tournsment, but dropped a 5-0 decision to Oshawa 2. The loss eliminated the locals from the overall championship

Georgetown played Oshawa quite even through the first period, trailing 1-0 at that point. However, the visitors were able to acore twice in each of the

following two periods to record the win. Georgetown appeared a little tired, especially in the final period of play. Coach Carson Mininch said his team was indeed fatigued.

Georgetown then shut out Acton Firefighter team 3-0 in the division semi final, and Mininch said playing Saturday was a little "anti-climatical" to Friday's playoff win.

"I think it was (anti-climatical)," he said. "We just didn't have the drive we had Friday."

Although his club did not capture their division title. Mininch said be is not that disappointed. His team went further than he thought it would.

"I thought the boys had a good year. We did quite well. We capped it off with a strong showing in the bantam tournament," he said.






