In you go

New class offered by soccer group

Those 18-year-olds interested in playing soccer on a recreational basis, but feel they can't due to no available leagues are now able to play.

The Georgetown Soccer Club (formerly the Georgetown Youth Soccer Club) will offer ladies and gentlemen under 21 to register for play this year. The move comes partly due to the folding of the Georgetown Falcons.

The Falcons, who played in the Toronto and District league, folded after problems experienced over the past few years. As a result club president Klaus Zander said a league must be organized to give those Falcons players a place to play this year, as well as those individuals who are not interested in playing with the Inter-County teams or the senior Meteor squad.

"We want to get the people who are sitting around doing nothing who want to play soccer. The friendships made here could be made for one's lifetime," Zander said.

Zander said registration for this league will not exceed the \$35 charged by the club. He also said judging how this year goes, maybe the concept could expand.

"Maybe we could try for a mixed league, or something," he said.

Zander expects registration this year to be a little lower than it was last year, but added the number of people interested still remains high at nearly 900. He said his phone has not stopped ringing since the last registration date.

The final registration day will be March 23 at the Alcott Arena. After then, late registrators will be charged an extra \$10.

The club changed its name partly because Georgetown is in the process of incorporating its soccer organizations. That means putting all soccer in Georgetown under one official banner.

"We took the 'Youth' out because we wanted to increase our age group to 21," Zander said. "Down the road sometime in the future maybe all the boys and girls soccer will be under one association, but that is a future prospect."

There will only be two rep soccer teams this year, down from four last year. Instead Georgetown will have select teams (including two girls teams) taking part in the Mid-Ontario leagues.

"Georgetown is large in quantities, but not so good in quality," Zander said. "We have a tough time competing against places like Oakville, Milton and Burlington."

"Since the players will be in the house leagues, there will be a greater number to pick from."

Another first for the club this year will be paying referees. This is the reason why the registration fee went up from \$32.50 to \$35.

"We have to build up our referees and this is the only way we see we can do it, that is we pay a few dollars each game."

Zander said the club is interested in having youngsters referee Mini and Mosquito games in order to gain experience also.

"There are just continuous changes. Some are new ideas while others are ones we tried earlier, but this wasn't their time. I'm only interested in those ideas which will help the children," he said.

Running hints

After several years of running one's motivation can occasionally take a beating. Knowing what we know about fitness and the importance of maintaining some semblance of consistency it's still too easy to take a few days off or reduce the mileage to a point where we are gaining little benefit.

This brings us to the topic of motivation. One of the best ways to motivate, is to set goals for yourself. So many miles per week, to lose so many pounds or to run your 10 kilometer time just a little faster.

One of the better motivators is entering road races. Fortunately two progressive companies have realized this and have come up with an award system for national class and recreational runners alike. The sponsors - Miller beer and Times watches - have developed a ranking system to be used in 16 local races where runners can achieve Bronze, Silver or Gold levels.

As well they have a point system depending on your final placing which when added over the 16 races will determine an overall winner. This is great because it encourages competition with yourself first and with others second. It's also great to see two companies not directly associated with the running industry like a shoe or sportswear company, promoting this program.

Here is how it works. First you must be a member of the Ontario Track and Field Association. This is easier than it sounds. An application can be obtained by writing the OFTA, 1200 Sheppard Ave. East, Willowdale Ont., M2K 1X1. For \$20 you will receive a membership and a one year subscription to "Athletics" magazine.

Then all you have to do is enter any of the 16 races. Eight are over the next couple of months.
