Man stands trial for criminal negligence

Judge Douglas Latimer found enough evidence for Keith Rieger to stand trial for criminal negligence causing death. A preliminary hearing was held last Wednesday in Milton provincial court.

The charge stems from a Dec. 18 accident which claimed the life of Kenneth Morrow. The car Mr. Morrow had been a passenger in hit a bridge abutment and rolled into the creek below. trapping the Georgetown teenager.

Court heard evidence from a number of witnesses who were at the scene of the accident in Glen Williams.

Mr. Rieger's lawyer said the evidence fell short of what one would normally expect, in order to warrant a charge of criminal negligence causing death.

Judge Latimer said Mr. Rieger would also be charged with impaired driving and driving over the legal limit.

Mr. Rieger, a Sixth Line resident in Esquesing, has chosen to be tried by judge and jury in district court.






