

Schools support safety village

Oakville trustee Len Crosier said if the children's safety village concept managed to save the life of one child it was worth it.

Mr. Crosier's comment came as the Halton Board of Education gave its support to the proposed children's safety village under the auspices of the Halton regional police.

Director Wally Beevor said the board would support the concept through school field trips as opposed to funding.

Trustee Cam Jackson said while he supported the idea there is still money involved in school field trips through transportation costs and asked for some reaction from the Principal's Association.

The children's safety village would be used as a training site to encourage practical learning of the rules of the road.

A site has been selected north of the Halton regional headquarters on Bronte Road in Oakville and police spokesmen believe construction could be completed by September 1985.

Their fancy footwork nets couple \$7,500

They did it. Raising about \$7,500 over the weekend, two Georgetown couples out-

did 30 other fundraisers and set themselves a new record at an Easter Seals dance marathon.

Bob and Carol Marchand and Ron and Dayle Orton took part in a 24-hour dance marathon at an airport strip disco, beginning Saturday afternoon at 4 p.m.

The pledges raised by the two couples made up the bulk of the \$13,610 raised by all the marathon dancers to help crippled children.

It was Mr. and Mrs. Orton's second time taking part in a dance marathon and they beat their high school record of 20 hours and 20 minutes, set in Nova Scotia.

For Mr. and Mrs. Marchand, it was their first dance marathon, and they made it to the end.

"It was fun," Mr. Marchand said enthusiastically. "I don't have an ache or a pain. Carol hung in good. She got her yawns the odd time, but she doesn't have an ache either."

"Ron, that guy has energy coming from nobody knows. His pace the last four hours was better than anybody's. His feet were bouncing all around," he said.

It was Mrs. Orton who carried the suffering for the four of them. She got a rash on her leg and her knee gave out on her Sunday at 10 a.m.

"But she's strong minded. She kept going," Mr. Marchand said with respect.

He said about 30 people from Georgetown dropped over to encourage the dancers. Whenever a

friend or relative turned up, it seemed the clock jumped another 15 minutes or an hour, Mr. Marchand said.

The dancers didn't find the going too difficult Saturday night, as the disco was open for regular customers as well as the dance marathons.

Between 1 and 2:30 a.m., CBLT's television cameras were there to film the action for the

Easter Seals Superthon telethon.

"The lights were brighter and we were on TV. That was fun and the people were still excited," Mr. Marchand said.

Mr. and Mrs. Orton were interviewed by Barbara McCloud at 2 a.m.

"It was really good. Who knows if we'll do it again," Mr. Marchand said.
