Edith Behie has been a member of the GLT for almost three years during which time she has appeared in four different productions. She last appeared as Vickie Reynolds in "Busby" and in 1984 played Shirley Hughes who turned out to be everyone's darling in "The Man Most Likely To".

Edith, as Suzy, is both hindered and eventually helped by Gloria, a ten-year-old. Gloria is played by Hollie Shields. Hollie

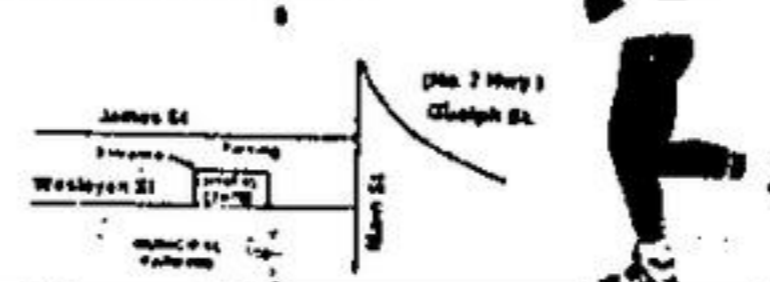
