Provincial funding support won't meet expected levels

The Halton Board of Education wasn't expecting an increase in provincial grant money of more than one per cent. But what they got was a decrease of .2 per cent in provinciai support.

The .2 per cent decrease in provincial funding means a \$139,000 loss to the board in funds this year and leaves provincial support representing 40.8 per cent of the operating expendit-

· In a last ditch attempt to keep double digit taxation away from Halton residents, the board was unsuccessful. The increase was only .5 per cent over the 9.9 per cent tax increase they had been aiming towards.

The 10.4 per cent mill rate rise will represent an average increase in local taxes of \$70 a year for a home assessed at \$7,000, bringing the total

The 1985 budget is an 3.47 per cent over the 1984 actual operating expenditures. When the provincial

grant information was received by the board March 29 the administration was instructed by the finance committee to further reduce the budget by \$400,000 in order to obtain a 9.9 tax increase.

At a special board

meeting April 4 trustees presented a motion to reinstate the \$400,000 budget reduction.

In a close vote of eight to seven, the further reductions were kept in the budget. .

Oakville trustee Pat Hillhouse said that Halton had one of the least expensive school systems which was a benefit to the taxpayer. She said additional

Janis Millman, another Oakville trustee, asked when the board was going to stop mumbling amongst themselves. stop protecting the taxpayer and approach the province.

"By cutting our budget to support them (the province) we are selling ourselves and our kids for short," she said.

Trustee Bill Priestner drew a comparison to Toronto and stated that in general and business administration it was costing the board \$46 per student in the elementary level while in Toronto

it was \$140 per student. "That's where we're doing it (saving costs) not in the classrooms," he said.

The acceptance of the 1985 expenditures budget took almost two months to finalize.


