The centre is a 175-acre outdoor classroom for the study of the outdoors run by the Peel Board of

Education. It serves children from kindergarten to Grade 19 on a daily basis for most of the year.

Mr. Taylor explained how the Indians processed maple syrup. He also showed the cubs Indian dances which were used to celebrate the coming of spring.

The cubs had an outdoor lunch of hot dogs, moose juice and ice cream with maple syrup.

Leaders assisting with the trip were Mrs. Barb Taylor, Ken Nokes, Paul Thompson and Ron Hise-man from 1st Georgetown, Roy Frost and Hans Treviranous from 1st Hornby, and Vic Auger from 1st Scotch Block.

Rob Taylor and Sandy Caves, outdoor educators at the centre, conducted the trip.

A highlight of the day was a hayride to the sugar shack. The cubs learned about different kinds of trees, how to find the exact spot on a tree to drill, and the whole maple syrup process. The cubs also studied bark, moss and fungus.

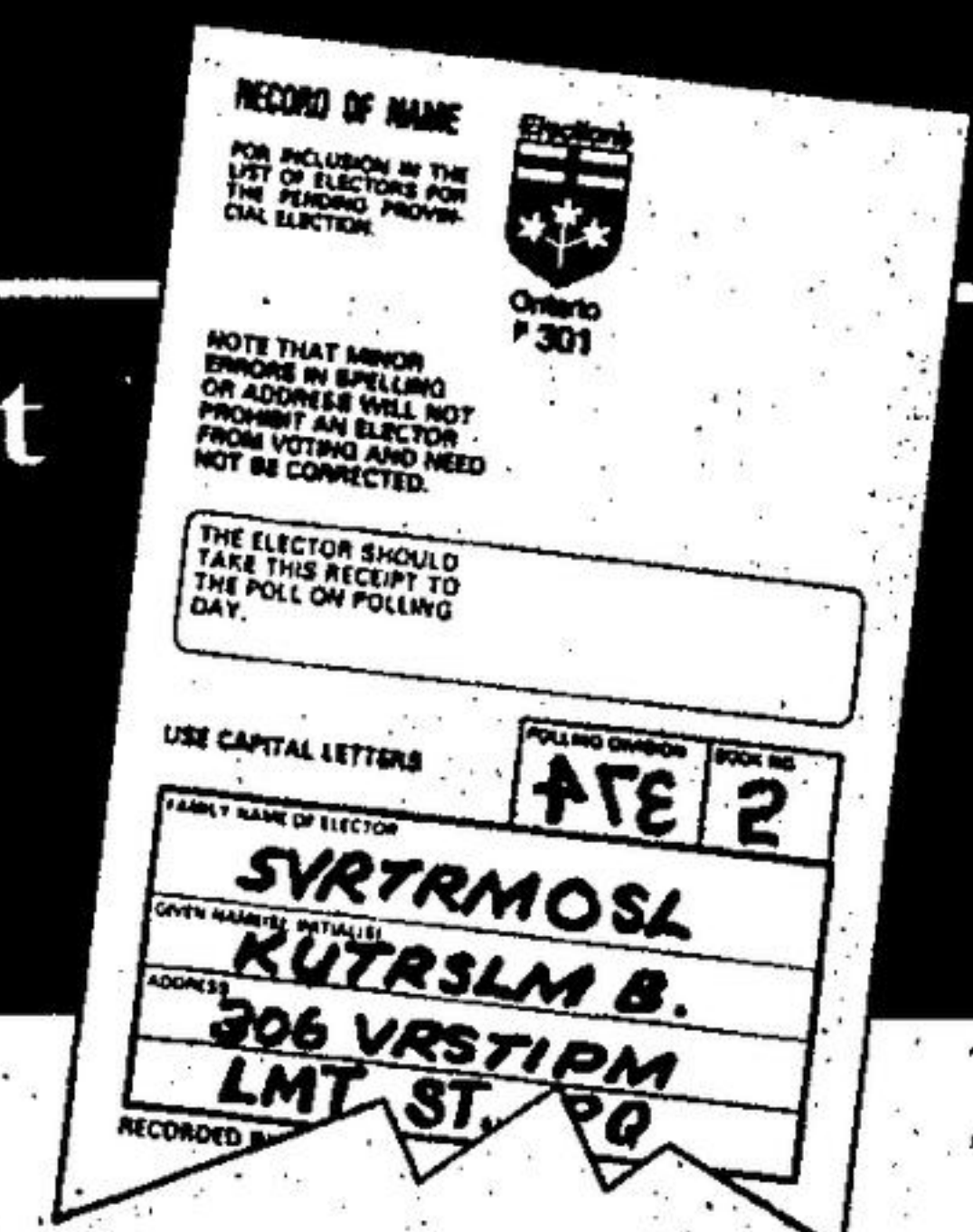

**Elections Ontario**

KEEPING YOU INFORMED

**\* Who is eligible to vote?**

Those persons who, at the time of voting, have attained 18 years of age, are Canadian citizens or British subjects, have resided in Ontario for the 12 months preceding Election Day, and who are not disqualified by law from voting.

If you were enumerated and given Form 301, but -

- Have since moved.
- Changed your name.

PHONE THE NUMBER FOR YOUR AREA.

**Rural resident?**

If you are qualified to vote but your name is not on the Voters' List, you may vote by having a voter who knows you (on the same polling division list) "Vouch" for you on Oath at the polling place on Election Day.

**Voting by proxy**

If you cannot vote in person on Election Day or at the Advance Poll, you may appoint another qualified voter as a proxy voter if -

- You are employed in long distance transportation, or
- You are away attending an educational institution, or
- You are physically handicapped and unable to attend a polling place, or
- You are a member of the Canadian Forces on active duty.
