session. "It's a little scary I guess, but I had a safety line on and had a rope attached to my hand that went to Gwyneth's hand so if there had been any problems we could have gotten out. However it is a little restricting," he

Like Burley, Ancker said the bottom was sandy, and generally visibility was limited.

But Ancker said now that Burley has his certification sent in the mail for processing, the two are anxiously waiting for

their trip. "The first day we can take it is May I and that is when we are going there," Ancker said.

We can hardly wait. "From what I've heard the diving is quite good. There are a lot of wrecks, and some of them you can see from the shore and go right

straight to the wreck." The divers walked out from the shore, which was free of ice. When they got to ice, they broke it until the water was deep enough to dive
