Student skip-a-thon nets \$3,000 for charity

Over 120 students, seven teachers and the school secretary skipped for two hours last Friday at Howard Wrigglesworth Public School to raise money for the Heart Foundation and a student.

Ken Middaugh, staff coordinator of the event hopes that the school will raise \$3,000 from the skip-a-thon.

The school gets to keep 5 per cent of the proceeds from the event. The school has decided to give that 5 per cent to a student, Justin Fenfold, who lost his leg to cancer. The money is to help Justin with his medical expenses.

The students started skipping in preparation for the skip-a-thon two months ago. Mr. Middaugh said there has been a shift in attitude among the boys about skipping. They now feel that there's nothing wimpy about skipping, he said.

The students were divided into groups of six, with one person from each group skipping at a time. Each student skipped for about 20 minutes.

There were many volunteers helping out the children, who skipped to the beat of popular music blaring from a portable stereo.

The students were sponsored money per minute, per team for the event. The school does one fund-raising event a year as a rule, said Mr. Middaugh. We got the idea from a pamphlet sent out from the Heart Foundation which outlined the skip-a-thon, he said.

1985 TAXES INTERIM BILLING

In accordance with the provisions of The Municipal Act, pursuant to By-law 85-10 adopted by Council on January 14th, 1985, the first two instalments of taxes for 1985 will become due as follows:

ALL WARDS FIRST INSTALMENT February 27th, 1985

SECOND INSTALMENT April 24th, 1985

The above instalments represent an interim billing of 1985 taxes based upon one-half of last year's residential mill rates. The final tax bill will be issued about the middle of the year and will also be payable in two instalments, normally the last Wednesday in June and September.

Upon default of payment of the interim tax levy as set out above, a penalty of one and one-quarter (1 1/4) percent of the amount in default shall be added on the first day of default and on the first day of each and every calendar month. Ratepayers who have not received a tax bill should make immediate application at 35 Main Street South, Georgetown, or by telephone (877-5185 or 453-2411).

PAYMENT OF TAXES

These taxes may be paid at the locations and in the manner detailed on the back of the tax bill.

Favourite Recipes

BAKED HADDOCK WITH STUFFING

1/2 c. Chopped Onion
1/4 c. Chopped Celery
1/2 c. Chopped Fresh Mushrooms
3 Tbsp. Butter
2 c. Soft Bread Crumbs
1 Tsp. Salt
1/8 Tsp. Pepper
1/8 Tsp. Tarragon

Arrange 2 lbs fresh (or thawed) HADDOCK FILLETS on a greased shallow baking dish (quite large) in a single layer.

Saute the onion, celery and mushrooms in the butter for about 5 mins. Then stir in the bread crumbs, salt, pepper and tarragon.

Sprinkle the fish first with lemon, then the crumb mixture.

Cover with peeled, sliced tomatoes and bake, uncovered 35-40 mins. at 375°F.
