# Lockhurst heading out East

Lockhurst and his Hamilton-Dundas Tigers teammates will be playing a lot of hockey in a very short period of time.

Dundas travelled out to Cornerbrook, Newfoundland early Friday morning to play in the Eastern Canada Senior "A" championship. The winner of this best-of-seven series will not only advance on to the Allan Cup, but host the national Senior "A" championship too.

Dundas flew out from Toronto at 8:15 a.m. for St. John's. Upon landing the team had a 90-minute bus ride to Cornerbrook.

Not only will the Ontario champs have to contend with the long trip, but the series opened Friday night, and the first four games played on consecutive nights. The teams will then get a one-day rest, then play the next three games consecutively if necessary.

Lockhurst said he is excited about playing in the series, but adds it is hard to prepare for a team the Tigers have no idea about.

"The only thing we've heard is Cornerbrook is a Petrolia-type team," he said Thursday night. "Our coaches went out Monday (April 8), so maybe they'll know a bit more."

Dundas qualified for the Eastern final by dumping Flamboro 4-2 in their best-of-seven Ontario championship. Lockhurst said he wasn't surprised his club won the league title despite finishing fifth overall in the league standings. "I think if you go back, from January on we

were one of the hottest teams in the league," he said.

The Tigers faced first-place Cambridge in the first round of the playoffs, which was a surprise to Lockhurst and his mates. However, he said the selection was what Dundas wanted too.

"We wanted Cambridge," he said. "We were nervous about Georgetown, because on paper they had the best team as far as I was concerned."

Lockhurst and Rod Sachs split the goaltending chores against Cambridge, and the two split the first two games of the final with Flamboro. However, Sachs played the next four games, but with the advent of four consecutive games in the Eastern series Lockhurst said the team will again rotate their goalies.

For insurance, Dundas picked up Flamboro backup Bob Ferguson as well as six players from their Smithville affiliate. All in all, the Tigers will take a roster of about 30 players to New-

foundland to insure fresh players each game as well as guard against injury.

As expected, Lockhurst and his mates have received a lot of good luck messages from friends. But Lockhurst has gotten calls from friends he has here in Georgetown.

"Everything has worked well for us," he said. "The league this year was really tough. When you go down the teams' rosters and see their hockey players, I think it boiled down to the team that wanted to win the most ended up winning."

"But this is what it is all about, and I'm really excited." Lockhurst said the thought of hosting an Allan Cup final will be plenty incentive for the Dundas team.

"It really is. We'd like to bring home another series to Dundas."

"Like I said, we don't know anything about the team from Newfoundland, but I do know it is going to take a heck of a team to beat us. I'm confident we can do it."

### Dundas loses final

Prior to any of the Allan Cup semi final games, The Herald contacted former Raider goalie Jim Lockhurst about playing in the Eastern Canada final. Lockhurst, who was released from the team early in the 1984-85 season, is now a member of the Ontario Senior "A" champs Dundas-Hamilton Tigers. After four games, the Tigers did not fare that well. Cornerbrook, Newfoundland has won the Eastern final in four straight games.
