#### Insurance rates increase

Herald Staff With hefty lawsuits being waged against neighboring municipalities. the town's increasing its liability insurance to \$10 million for any one claim.

Monday night, councillors reviewed the \$99,441 insurance program they have with Frank Cowan Company Limited for 1985.

While the rates for property and automobile fleet insurance haven't changed much over 1984, the rates for municipal liability insurance have aignificantly increased. They've, gone from \$20,190 in 1984 to \$35,380

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
